

## **Defying Gravity!**








## Couple's Night Out






## **SEPTEMBER 14th**

# United Methodist Church Leads Global Church in Divestment from Occupier Governments

Press Release – Religious News – August 18<sup>th</sup>, 2025

The United Methodist Church (UMC), one of the world's largest Christian denominations, has become the world's first church to announce a historic policy to divest and exclude the bonds of governments maintaining prolonged illegal military occupations, namely Israel, Turkey and Morocco, thereby fulfilling the call of the church's General Conference in 2024. Wespath, the church's primary investing agency, manages the pensions and health benefits of the church's clergy in a portfolio of more than \$26 billion, the world's largest reported portfolio of a faith-based institution. For decades, justice advocates in the church have called for this agency to divest its holdings that support and profit from the Israeli occupation of Palestinian Territories.

Since 2010, United Methodists for Kairos Response (UMKR), named for the Palestinian Christian movement Kairos Palestine, has led the call for United Methodist ethical investing that would reflect the church's long-held positions supporting Palestinian human rights and freedom from occupation.

The UMC's General Conference, the denomination's top decision-making body, on April 30, 2024, adopted a landmark resolution written and submitted by UMKR, calling for all church investors to avoid investing in the government bonds of Israel, Turkey, and Morocco, due to their prolonged, illegal military occupations of their neighbors: Palestine, Northern Cyprus, and Morocco. Various United Nations bodies have identified these decades-long occupations as illegal and violating the rights of the peoples whose territories they are controlling and colonizing.

This groundbreaking legislative success in 2024 – the first Christian denomination in the world to call for divestment from Israel's bonds – was the result of many years church-wide education, grassroots mobilization, and denominational lobbying by UMKR. This church movement was launched in 2010 with the express goal of achieving significant divestment action in the denomination, in response to the Palestinian BDS Call of 2005 (BDS: boycott, divestment, sanctions) which was echoed in the Kairos Palestine Document "A Moment of Truth" in 2009.

The resolution makes clear the church's intention to avoid profiting from the suffering and oppression caused by these decades-long occupations: Israel's occupation of the West Bank including East Jerusalem and the Gaza Strip since 1967, Turkey's occupation of Northern Cyprus since 1974, and Morocco's occupation of Western Sahara since 1976.

The United Nations has identified flagrant human rights violations in all of these occupations, including: land confiscation, theft of natural resources, home demolitions and illegal colonization, deprivation of food and water, violence against civilians, mass incarceration for population control, and brutality against children.

The announcement by Wespath comes in the midst of growing international outrage over Israel's genocidal assault on Palestinians in Gaza and the expansion in settlers and military violence, ethnic cleansing, and annexation plans in the occupied West Bank including East Jerusalem. That outrage has been reflected in bolder actions by world powers and increasing calls for sanctions on Israel in the U.S. Congress.

By not investing in Israeli bonds, United Methodists reduce their complicity in Israel's genocide, apartheid regime, and its 77-year-old occupation of the Occupied Palestinian Territories.

## You're missed: A message to those who haven't been at church lately

You are an important part of the body of Christ, and we have a seat ready for you in worship, at a shared table or in a small group! We welcome you to reconnect with a United Methodist faith family, or to engage with us for the first time.

If you haven't been to church in a while, that's okay. We understand. With the changes and challenges we've been facing in the past half-dozen years, we all have needed to take time to process and reevaluate.

While we understand, we also invite you to reconnect, rekindle your relationships and get involved once more.

**Unable to attend in person?** Watch a livestream of worship services and ask a pastor about other ways you can be involved in the life of the congregation.

Chances are things are different than when you were last at church. Pastors have changed appointments, ministries have evolved or shifted their focus, and the community might have grown. Don't let sentimentality get in the way of your spiritual connectedness with others. Church may not feel the same as it did when you last attended, nor how it may have felt with former pastors or worship leaders. Your friends will probably look and feel older, maybe many have passed away or moved, the crowd might be smaller, there may be some new faces you don't know yet. *But all of that is okay.* The church is a living and breathing organic system subject to the same life changes as you and I. Get curious about the **new** things God is doing and how God might be calling you to take part.

All Christians are vital to the faith community. As Paul says in Romans 12, "In the same way, though there are many of us, we are one body in Christ, and individually we belong to each other."

#### COMMUNITY NOURISHES FAITH

The United Methodist Church is a safe space to be your authentic self, the unique and beautiful individual that God created you to be. You can ask challenging questions and wrestle with difficult decisions. You can thrive in a community where everyone is trying to figure out their purpose and live as faithful disciples of Christ.

While a strong faith is not dependent upon church attendance, being part of a body of believers is an essential aspect of mission, worship and celebration. Together, we pray, grow, celebrate communion and baptisms, and share joys and heartaches.

Church families offer support in times of distress, refuge in times of fear, healing in times of pain and a place to anchor during life's storms. They'll also join you in giving thanks when you are celebrating good news or exciting life events.

The outpouring of care that comes from your congregation comes directly from God. God moves among us and asks us to use our time and talents to serve each other. Don't miss an opportunity to be the hands and feet of Christ – and to accept this gift when you are in need.

#### EXTEND INVITATIONS TO PEOPLE YOU MISS

If you're reading this and you're already active in a congregation, you are likely missing people who used to be part of your faith community. You are not alone. The yearning you have to reconnect with people might be a call from God to amp up your outreach and invitation efforts.

Be sure your church is offering a good mix of discipleship opportunities, fellowship events and mission activities. This will ensure families and individuals can find a place to plug in, no matter where they are on their faith journey.

Personal invitations will always be the most powerful acts of evangelism. Call or text people you haven't seen in a long time, ask how they are doing and invite them to join you for a cup of coffee. One-on-one interactions open the door to deeper understanding of what is happening in a person's life. Then, you can share ways that the church can support them.

Don't be disheartened. Time and patience are ever-present elements of outreach. Continue to pray about your efforts and listen to God's prompting and direction.

Too much for right now? Start slowly.

If participating in a worship service feels like too much right now, remember that Sunday mornings are not the only time churches are active. Follow nearby churches on social media and subscribe to their e-newsletters so that you are aware of opportunities to engage. Consider these ideas:

- •Fellowship events: Attend a fall festival, Advent cookie swap, Easter egg hunt, ice cream social, chili cook-off, craft night or pancake breakfast. These gatherings present an opportunity to see familiar faces, meet new people and catch up on congregational news.
- •Bible study or small groups: Small groups are the perfect places to ask questions and learn from others' perspectives. Perhaps your pastor leads a weekly study, or groups gather throughout the week to pray together. Joining a smaller group can be a solid first step back into the larger community.
- •Mission efforts: Volunteering at the food bank, Vacation Bible School, community garden days or similar events are excellent times to nurture relationships. Serving alongside those who share your passions will help you find commonality and build friendships.

#### YOU BELONG HERE

God calls us to lean on each other, to ban together in mission and to grow, both in personal relationships with Christ and as a faith family. These facets of God's grace and love can only be found through communal worship, prayer and fellowship. Don't miss out on the many blessings that God has waiting in a United Methodist congregation near you.

## Wisconsin UMCOR in Milwaukee for Flood Relief

The Wisconsin Conference Disaster Response Coordinators have been on-the-scene in Southeast Wisconsin since the August 10-11 flooding. Over 1,500 clean-up kits from the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) have been distributed with more on the way from Midwest Mission. Currently, the Coordinators are working out of First UMC in Waukesha and the first cleanup crews are arriving from Northern Illinois.

The Wisconsin Conference Disaster Relief is partnering with the Red Cross to create a multi-agency resource center for residents impacted by the historic flooding in Milwaukee and southeast Wisconsin. The resource centers are one-stop locations where people affected by the disaster can receive assistance and learn about available resources as they begin planning the next steps in their recovery.

## Release from the Milwaukee Health Department August 18th, 2025

MILWAUKEE – The City of Milwaukee Health Department (MHD) is urging city residents impacted by the historic flooding last week to take advantage of free cleaning kits available. Milwaukee Commissioner of Health, Mike Totoraitis, said, "We are grateful to UMCOR and The Salvation Army for their partnership and commitment to supporting our community."

## **Prayer Vigil Targets Immigration Policies**

August 26<sup>th</sup>, 2025

Fath leaders gathered Monday outside Miami Correctional Facility [near Bunker Hill, Indiana] to protest state and federal immigration policies. The demonstration followed a federal announcement earlier this month that the north-central Indiana prison would house up to 1,000 immigrants detained during enforcement operations. About 150 people attended the vigil, where clergy led prayers, hymns, and scripture readings. Reverend Matt Landry of Castleton United Methodist Church said they stood "in prayerful support and solidarity of our immigrant brothers and sisters" and lamented the use of detention centers. The group also criticized language they say dehumanizes immigrants, including the Trump Administration's nickname for the facility: "Speedway Slammer." Pastor Steve Cain of Union Chapel United Methodist Church in Decatur said scripture calls for supporting immigrants, adding, "There's no way you can escape the justice message in Scripture for those who are sojourners."



## Leadership Council Update

#### At their August 24<sup>th</sup> meeting, the Leadership Council made the following decisions:

- (1) "Approve a one-time apportionment payment between ~\$16,000 to the Conference in December 2025." This is consistent with what previous Councils have done since 2014.
- (2) "Starting January 2025, we will begin making monthly apportionment payments. We will begin by paying one-fourth of the total monthly bill throughout 2025. Approximately \$500 monthly."
- (3) "Leadership Council will provide the main 'fixings' for the 9/7 cookout."
- (4) New policies were constructed for the secured use of our new church credit cards.
- (5) "Send letter to Love Inc. indicating our removal as a member church." This came after concerns of doctrinal squabbling within Love Inc., accusations of discrimination from LGBTQ clients, and a further misalignment from the organization's stated purpose and the Reconciling Status of our church.
- (6) All plants with stickers or thorns will be removed from the property and a policy will be put in place to keep new plants (like rose bushes) from being planted on church property.
- (7) "Fix the main entry door's crash bar at a cost of around \$1,900." A bent mechanism into the push bar has been making the front doors hard to use and lock.
- (8) Creation of a new, unpaid position titled "Property Manager' to begin in 2026; this person will work with Jeff, particularly with matters concerning insurance and legalities.
- (9) The Council toured the multiple storage areas in the Lower Level of the church and made decisions on the retention and disposal of certain items and the future plans for these unused spaces. For instance, the old pastor's office/"paper room" will be kept empty but maintained as the church's library and history room.
- (10) Discussion: What would it take for us to be certified as a community shelter by the Red Cross?
- (11) Future discussion: Removing the dying tree in the parsonage's front yard.



Sunday School for children for the 2025-26 school year will continue to be on the second Sunday of each month during the worship service.

Rooted & Rising was founded in 1962 as the Methodist Children's Service and was initially based in Madison before opening a second office in Milwaukee in the early 70s. From the very beginning, housing, social work outreach, education, and community building have been at the core of the agency's mission. The Wisconsin Conference of The UMC and the United Methodist Women (UMW) were instrumental in the founding and support of this organization as it gained its foothold in the Milwaukee community. R&R manages 72 units of income-restricted apartments and townhouses near Washington Park (Milwaukee), provides a state-licensed childcare center, emergency food assistance, and provides events, resources, and spaces to foster community engagement.
