CHILDRENS MINISTRIES FOR 2023-2024

Our Children's & Youth Ministry Team has been working hard hammering out the details for our programming for our children this school year.

We will be providing a program each for the 3 general age-groups in our church:

Pre-K through 3rd Grade - Sunday School

WHEN: During the church service, following the Children's Message. 1st & 3rd Sundays of each month.

Curriculum: crafts and lesson

Led primarily by Lori Hintz and Ellen Mazurek + other volunteers

4th through 6th Grade – SPARK

WHEN: the same time as our Confirmation Course (see below). (2x a month—school year)

Curriculum: Spark Storytelling Bible

Goal: to help students learn the Bible stories and apply basic lessons to their lives.

6th Grade through High School – CONFIRMATION

WHEN: TBD by families' availability (2x a month – throughout the school year)

Curriculum: CONFIRM

Goal: prepare students to claim the faith for themselves
and become active, Professing Members of the church.

Length: Two-year course. (36 sessions total)

FOR EVERY SUNDAY MORNING:

Quiet Bags – for our toddler-age friends (filled with quiet toys)

Activity bags – for our younger & older children (filled with activity books, simple toys, crayons/colored pencils, and age-appropriate books)

Children's Worship Bulletins – for 3-6 AND 7-12 (handed out by the greeters).

Weekly activity pages based on Bible Stories.

Children's Messages – 2nd through 4th/5th Sundays. All who are young and young-at-heart.

CONFIRMATION



2023-2024

This is the official Confirmation course
in The United Methodist Church

How long is it?

Two-year course (September 2023 – May 2025)

36 sessions (18 a school year, 2 a month – September-May).

Each session is 1 hour long. (*note the additional requirements outside the sessions time*)

Ages: 6th Grade through high school

Cost: free

Times: TBD (*participants will together discern a time of the week; this will be the set time for the whole year*);

with some exceptions, each session will be every two weeks.

Leader: Pastor Caleb, with the occasional church member as a volunteer.

Location: Fellowship Hall at PEUMC.

Confirmation Ceremony: Sunday, June 8th, 2025 (Day of Pentecost)
(*may be adapted to coincide with student's 8th Grade Graduation Date*).

Years A & B: The 36 sessions will be divided into two years (A & B) of 18 sessions each. To include students each year, the *Confirm* will continue forward on a rotating basis, with incoming 7th graders in 2024 starting on session 19 with the 8th graders. This will allow us to continue including students without hosting multiple classes of Confirmation at once.

Pre CONFIRMATION


Our Pre-Confirmation course is called



This is for 4th through 6th Graders

These lessons will coincide with the regular Confirmation sessions.

These will be led by church volunteers.



Goal: To learn Bible stories and helping your child to think deeper about their faith life while connecting the Bible with real life.

The course will use the Spark Bible curriculum from SparkHouse Publications.

There is **no cost** for this.

Lessons will take place at the same time as the *Confirm* course (2x a month; as determined by its participants) and will meet at the opposite end of the Fellowship Hall.

This is not a “course” but a continuous program for 4th through 6th graders, to prepare for Confirmation.

Leader: church volunteer, with Pastor Caleb on occasion.

Restructuring the United Methodist Church

(Regionalizing Our Connexion)

BACKGROUND: The Methodist movement started in England but became an established Church and exploded in numbers in the United States during the 18th-19th centuries. For much of this time, missionary work was always going *out* from the U.S. to other places in the world. Wherever missionaries were sent, and local numbers grew, provisional annual conferences were formed. As annual conferences themselves grew in numbers, they were formed into regional groupings called central conferences. Central conferences connect annual conferences for common ministry, adapt regulations as the conditions in the respective regions may require, and elect bishops.

Today, **Africa** has 3 central conferences:

- (1) **Africa:** 10 annual conferences in 11 countries;
- (2) **Congo:** 14 annual conferences in 9 countries;
- (3) **West Africa:** 6 annual conferences in 6 countries.

Europe has 3 central conferences:

- (1) **Central and Southern Europe:** 7 annual conferences in 15 countries;
- (2) **Germany:** 3 annual conferences in 1 country;
- (3) **Northern Europe and Eurasia:** 10 annual conferences in 14 countries.

The **Philippines** has 1 central conference comprising of 24 annual conferences in 1 country.

The United States, by nature of our history and sending missionaries outward, does not have its own central conference. Our 54 American annual conferences are grouped into 5 jurisdictional conferences, which have roughly the same powers and duties as the central conferences in other places of the world, mainly, electing bishops.



However, . . . unlike U.S. jurisdictions, central conferences have authority under page 31 of our Book of Discipline to make “such changes and adaptations” to the Book of Discipline as missional needs and differing legal contexts require. This limited freedom was given because our American-based Discipline featured legalities and policies that would not make sense or be practical in other parts of the world. For instance, central conferences already adapt parts of the Discipline to accommodate the

requirements of different property laws. Some central conferences, such as the Philippines, have different ways of credentialing clergy. These central conferences needed that adaptability because the Discipline was largely by the U.S. for the U.S.

But our U.S. annual/jurisdictional conferences, do not have that same freedom of adaptability to our context. To make changes relevant to our Western, North American context, we must

wait for the General Conference (think “Global”), which is supposed to happen every 4 years, but has not had a regular session since 2016. In other words, Africans can make changes suitable for Africans; Filipinos can do the same for themselves; Europeans, too. But Americans cannot, not without the votes of all the delegates from around the entire denomination. While other regions of the world can make changes, the U.S. must wait for the world’s delegates to gather, making General Conference a heavily U.S.-oriented time. It also keeps the U.S. from making necessary changes, especially as our denomination’s numbers are declining in the Western cultures and increasing in the Eastern cultures.

BUT . . . there is widespread consensus now within the leadership of the UMC that regionalization is a win/win proposition for the whole church.

The goal: ***make the United States its own central conference with the same freedoms of adaptability as the rest of the denomination:***

- It allows the sharing of resources without imposing cultural views on others.
- It takes the U.S. Church out of the center and creates a common global structure.
- It creates necessary missional space between progressive and traditional annual conferences.
- It focuses the church on mission, not conflict.

This would be the biggest change in policy and structure in the UMC since 1968—maybe even before.

THE CHALLENGES:

(1) We’ve tried this before at every G.C. for a generation. They’ve all failed because each time it came up, the votes were taken as proxy on homosexuality. Traditionalists have long believed that with regionalization, the U.S. and Western Europe would allow ordination and marriage for LGBTQ persons. And they are right. A U.S. or European-only vote would have passed 12 years ago, similar to other U.S. denominations.

(2) This requires multiple constitutional amendments. Each constitutional amendment (not our nation’s Constitution, but our denomination’s) would require 2/3 majority of the G.C. present and a 2/3 ratification vote from each annual conference. In 2016, an amendment to the Constitution saying women are equal to men passed at G.C. but failed to be ratified by each annual conference.

(3) Communication in the UMC is hard. G.C. delegates in the US, Europe, and Philippines have their contact information posted online. Annual Conferences in Africa do not post this information. This is compounded by the reality of poor internet, lack of services, and unforeseen changes in who can get visas. This creates turnover and a communication vacuum that no one—not even the G.C. has solved. The G.C. struggles to get official UMC materials into the hands of delegates in Africa. This vacuum is a crisis that envelopes nearly 1/3 of all G.C. participants. We simply cannot communicate with one another.

(4) Every region in the UMC has publicly expressed support for regionalization, except Africa. Every U.S. J.C. has voted for it, so has conferences in Western Europe and the Philippines. Not a single A.C. in Africa has publicly voted to support regionalization. African

delegates comprise 1/3 of all votes at G.C. and delivered 60% of the votes for the Traditional Plan in 2019. There will be no regionalization without their approval. This is the question only African delegates can answer: Do regionalization provide enough distance and space to stay connected? The U.S. and European regions will openly ordain gay pastors; Africa will not.

(5) The same groups are still working against regionalization. The staff and board members of the conservative U.S. advocacy groups oppose regionalization, and they are not leaving. The Institute on Religion and Democracy, Good News, and the Wesleyan Covenant Association are all coming to G.C. 2024 to harvest more churches out of the UMC and into the Global Methodist Church. These groups have an undefeated record at G.C. in influencing votes in Africa. We must build a new coalition of those of us staying United Methodist, so our future church is not hijacked—again—by those who are leaving.

CONCLUSION: We have 9 months before G.C. 2024. Those of us around the globe who want to stay United Methodist have a once-in-a-generation opportunity to work together to build a great church! Regionalization offers the best path forward.

Members were asked to try to provide “old” recipes for our **Anniversary Potluck** on July 30th.

Bragging rights were given to those who could find a “turn-of-the-century” recipe and/or from an old Methodist cookbook. Those who brought recipes to the potluck were invited to fill out cards detailing their recipes. Some did not have cards, but the ones provided are listed below for your enjoyment:

- **Corn Ring** – “THE NEW SETTLEMENT COOKBOOK, 1ST EDITION” – 1901 – *Kathy Mills*
- **Seven Layer Salad** – First United Methodist Church – Hampshire, IL
- **Colby**, a semihard orange cheese, developed in Colby, WI, in 1885.
- **Grandma Wrasse’s Rice Pudding** – recipe shared by: De Ett Mann, submitted by: *Midge Herschleb*.
- **Roberta Bars** – Roberta Morrell’s nut bars
- **Brownie Recipe** - Found on the web: First-ever published brownie recipe found in the 1896 Sears and Roebuck’s Catalog. The frosting is my daughter’s homemade recipe. *Diane Sweat*.
- **Waldorf Triangles** (circa 1900) – *Sue Mitchell*
- **Streusel Coffee Cake** from a recipe that was made by my maternal grandmother for her 7 children.
- **Grated Apple Pie** – 1898 – from “WARE COOKBOOK,” Ware Methodist Episcopal Church in Ware, Massachusetts. (see Potato Puffs below)
- **Very Old Meatloaf Recipe** – A 207-year-old meatloaf recipe from 1807 or before. It called for deer meat, but I prefer using beef as did my Mother. Recipe by Jason Gaydos.
- **Pickled Beets**
- **My mother’s Apple Muffin** recipe found in a church cookbook from 1976. I have no idea how old the recipe is.
- **Potato Puffs** – recipe by Mrs. George S. Marsh – “LADIES OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH COOKBOOK, 1898”— Ware, Massachusetts (see Grated Apple Pie above) – *Pastor Caleb*

GARRISON KEILLOR ON METHODISTS

*Gary Edward "Garrison" Keillor (1942-) is an American author, singer, humorist, voice actor, and radio personality from Anoka, Minnesota



We make fun of Methodists for their blandness, their excessive calm, their fear of giving offense, their lack of speed, and also for their secret fondness for macaroni and cheese.

But nobody sings like them. If you were to ask an audience in New York City, a relatively Methodist-less place, to sing along on the chorus of MICHAEL ROW THE BOAT ASHORE, they will look daggers at you as if you had asked them to strip to their underwear. But if you do this among Methodists, they'd smile and row that boat ashore and up on the beach! And down the road!

Many Methodists are bred from childhood to sing in four-part harmony, a talent that comes from sitting on the lap of someone singing alto or tenor or bass and hearing the harmonic intervals by putting your little head against that person's rib cage.

It's natural for Methodists to sing in harmony. They are too modest to be soloists, too worldly to sing in unison. When you're singing in the key of C and you slide into the A⁷ and D⁷ chords, all two hundred of you, it's an emotionally fulfilling moment. By joining in harmony, they somehow promise that they will not forsake each other.

I do believe this: People, these Methodists, who love to sing in four-part harmony are the sort of people you can call up when you're in deep distress.

****If you're dying, they will comfort you.***

****If you are lonely, they'll talk to you.***

****And if you are hungry, they'll give you tuna salad.***

****Methodists believe in prayer but would practically die if asked to pray out loud.***

****Methodists like to sing, except when confronted with a new hymn or a hymn with more than four stanzas.***

****Methodists believe their pastors will visit them in the hospital, even if they don't notify them that they are there.***

****Methodists usually follow the official liturgy and will feel it is their way of suffering for their sins.***

****Methodists believe in miracles and even expect miracles, especially during their stewardship visitation programs or when passing the plate.***

Methodists think that the Bible forbids them from crossing the aisle while passing the peace.

****Methodists drink coffee as if it were the Third Sacrament.***

****Methodists feel guilty for not staying to clean up after their own wedding reception in the Fellowship Hall.***



Statement on Supreme Court Ruling on Affirmative Action

A statement from the General Secretaries of the General Board of Church and Society (GBCS), General Board of Higher Education and Ministry (GBHEM), General Commission on Religion and Race (GCORR), General Commission on the Status and Role of Women (GCSRW), and Discipleship Ministries.

June 29, 2023

Today's Supreme Court decision ruling unconstitutional the use of affirmative action is antithetical to the social teachings of The United Methodist Church. As stated in the Book of Resolutions, The United Methodist Church sees *"the most fundamental premise underlying the concept of affirmative action is both moral and spiritual ... According to biblical teaching, we are mandated, in the face of inhumane discrimination – whether that discrimination is intended or unintended – to do what we can to redress legitimate grievances and to create a society in which the lives of each and all will flourish"* (2016 Book of Resolutions, #3373: Affirmative Action). The Supreme Court's ruling will make the struggle to redress past injustices and advance equity even more difficult in our institutions and society.

As agencies of The United Methodist Church, we remain committed to the Wesleyan value of social justice and the social teachings of the Gospel as expressed in the Social Principles and Book of Resolutions and will continue to pursue inclusive and equitable practices in our hiring, programming, and institutional witness. We continue to believe *"given the tenacity of many forms of racism, sexism, and ableism – both blatant and subtle – the concept of affirmative action retains its relevance as part of an overall effort to create a more just and equitable social system"* (BOR 3373). **And** we will continue to reflect in our own practices and champion to the wider world the kin-dom values that seek to ensure access to and effective participation in all sectors of society for people of color, women, and persons with disabilities.

In response to today's ruling, we will advocate for a legislative response that will rectify historic inequities and expand present opportunities in the face of continued obstacles based on race, sex, and ability. Furthermore, we will advocate for an active response by United Methodists and people of faith to support our constituents, educational institutions, and ecumenical partners who will be negatively impacted by today's ruling and to recommit to our own practices of justice, inclusion, and equity in the church and society.






