Baptism of Glenna Sunderland


Glenna has been with us for quite some time now!

Consecration Sunday is Coming!

Sunday, November 12th

Financial stewardship does not focus on paying the bills; it is not even about supporting a budget. We actively seek to avoid the scarcity mindset: "this is all we can afford to do in missions and ministry," which leads to never-ending cutbacks and feelings of deficiency.

The money we have—we've certainly earned it! But it is still God's gracious gift to us: to Whom all blessings flow! Christian stewardship sees our contribution as a way to grow spiritually in our relationship with God by supporting good works of outreach and mission with a percentage of our incomes. We see the world in abundance: "this is what we get to do here!" In other words, we put our money where our heart is!

Consecration Sunday is the name of our 2023 stewardship program. Our church leadership chose this as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving.

Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical teachings that describes our need to give as a way to mature spiritually, rather than on the need of the church to receive: "your heart will be where your treasure is" (Matthew 6:21). United Methodists do not practice membership dues; we are followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. Consecration Sunday encourages us toward proportionate and regular giving practices in response to the question,

"What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

On the morning of November 12th, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world. You may interpret this as a change in giving starting immediately or for the new year.

Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of

Giving Card does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if they choose not to fill out a card. Getting our cards to reflect reality as close as possible keeps the church from having to "guess" their way throughout the year, wondering what the giving will be like from month to month.

COMING

We will not solicit you at your home. During morning worship, retired pastor Rev. Barry Yarbro will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a spiritual act of worship.

The worship will be followed by a reserved Celebration Luncheon. Reservations will be made during the worship services on October 29th and November 5th. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their *Estimate of Giving Cards*, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

Thank you in advance for your enthusiastic participation in the biblical and spiritual dimensions of generous giving! Thank you for your past and future contributions to our church's ministry!

PASTOR CALEB'S FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTION

At the time of this article, my 2024 salary has not yet been determined.

My 2023 base salary has been \$49,920.

I had chosen to deduct 13% from my salary for my pension.

(which will be taxed & tithed upon withdrawal),
leaving a total of \$43,430.40.

From this amount, my 2023 tithe (10%) was broken into 3 components (all going to the Church):

- 1% am I choosing to go to the greater denominational ministries: \$434.30
- 1% am I choosing to go to the Wisconsin Conference ministries: \$434.30
- 8% remains at Port Edwards UMC: \$3,474.43 (\$66.82 weekly giving).

Lalways give 2% of my tithe toward ministries beyond the local church since United Methodist clergy are *not* members of the local church but of the Annual Conference and I have vowed in my ordination to support the denomination at all levels by my own "prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness."

It is still 10% to Christ's holy Church.

**My adjusted giving for 2024 will be published in the December newsletter. A pastor's salary is considered "public," but I have also chosen to share my tithing practices with you to inspire others to strive for the same!



OUR ADVENT STUDY

Light of the World: A Beginner's Guide to Advent by Amy-Jill Levine

In this Advent study (© 2019), author, professor, and biblical scholar Amy-Jill Levine explores the biblical texts surrounding the story of the birth of Jesus. Join her as she traces the Christmas Story through the narratives of Zechariah and Elizabeth (Week 1), Mary and the Angel (Week 2), Birth of Jesus and His First Visit to the Temple (Week 3), Joseph, the Magi, and the Killing of the Innocents (Week 4).



Amy-Jill is Jewish, so she offers a unique perspective into the nativity story in light of Jewish tradition and the Old Testament, as well as the realities of the first century.

She also draws out implications for today and how we live as followers of Christ.

From a review: "I found this an easy to read, insightful book that provides background for the stories of Jesus' birth. There were a number of connections and insights I had not read or heard before that will enhance my own [spiritual life]."

Amy-Jill Levine is Professor of New Testament & Jewish Studies at Vanderbilt Divinity School.

The book is optional, but we do encourage each participant to request a copy when they register. The books are \$12.00 each. The due date to reserve a book through the church is November 15th. You are still welcome to participate without a book.

We will be encouraging a carpool system for the rides to Marshfield.

Greeter & Usher Duties - UPDATED

To clarify (and simplify) the various worship servant roles each week,

I have taken the liberty to update our Greeter and Usher duties (slightly):

Greeters:

Before the service: remain near the front entry to welcome people in;

help people cross the parking lot when needed; take an umbrella out when needed (etc.).

After the service: they will return to the lobby doors to thank each person as they leave;

NOT Greeter Duties: hand out bulletins; hand out guest cards/gifts; do anything during the service.

Ushers:

Before the service: turn on all the sanctuary lights; light candles;

hand out bulletins by the sanctuary entry.

During the service: lock the front doors; collect blue prayer cards;

bring offering plate forward during the 'doxology' and place on Communion Table.

After the service: extinguish the candles; turn off all lights; collect the offering money

and turn in to the Financial Secretary's Office; lock the front doors.

NOT Usher Duties: hand out guest cards/gifts; stand by the front doors; turn on the sound system.

H Season of Saints - 2023

"Saints" comes from the same roots as "holy." "Holy" means to be "set apart." Paul addresses many of his letters to the "saints" (lay people) of his churches. United Methodists do not canonize formal saints like some other Christian traditions, but we gladly recognize those individuals (living and dead) who have made powerful impacts on our own lives and spiritualities. These "role models" are what we celebrate on our annual "All Saints Sunday" observance (10/29).

But now he is back with his wife, relaxing in their home on Cape Cod, Mass.

I had three groomsmen on my side: **Josh Smith** (my longtime best friend; the one with twin boys, one named Trevor and the other, Caleb, after me!); **Patrick Lindstrom** (a friend from Eastern Illinois University Wesley Foundation); and **Akihito Kojima Kneeld** (another friend from EIU Wesley Foundation). Doug had on his side: **Claire Douglass** (associate pastor of Sun Prairie UMC and close friend from church camp); **Chris Meissner** (another friend from church camp); and **Paige Boyer** (a pastor from Ohio; friend from camp and seminary colleague; with us on our Rome trip).

Our respective families and a few close friends were in attendance. Cupcakes and a small cake came from Bloom Bake Shop in Madison. The dinner was catered by Broadway Diner in Baraboo (pulled pork and salmon options). Our photographer was Angie Zelora Photography from Madison. Zach Busch, our musician, works at Christ Presbyterian Church in Madison. We sang several congregational hymns: Our Processional Hymn was "Christ, We Come with Joy and Gladness," set to the tune of "Joyful, Joyful." Our middle hymn was "O God, Bestow Your Love and Care," a hymn from the book *Hymns for the Holy Other: Hymns Affirming the LGBTQIA2S+ Community*. These words were set to the tune of "The Gift of Love." Our closing song was "John Wesley's Rule of Life" ("Do all the good you can, by all the means you can . . .") Our marriage announcement was followed by a joyful response of "Halle, Halle, Hallelujah!"

For the sand ceremony, our musician played and sang "For Always," a song by my favorite film composer, **John Williams**. Holy Communion featured Sergei Rachmaninoff's classic "Eighteenth Variation on a Theme by Paganini" (the one I play at church on the 15th) and another song by Franz Liszt.

The ceremony was joyful, relaxed, quasi-traditional, but very liturgical, in a beautiful rustic setting. (Photos to come later once our photographer develops our album.)

The evening was spent hearing spectacular speeches from people and playing some table games to help our families and friends get better acquainted.

Doug and I spent a few days relaxing at the **Wilderness Resort** on Lake Delton, enjoying the indoor waterpark and other attractions in the area (particularly the restaurants). We concluded our mini honeymoon by getting vintage photos taken as passengers on the Titanic! They now adorn the staircase in the parsonage! They are a joy to behold!

INTRODUCING GUEST/PEW AMBASSADORS

What is everybody's business becomes nobody's business.

What are Pew Ambassadors? Pew Ambassadors are simply in charge of making sure that our Sunday morning guests are welcomed and acclimated to our service and facilities. These individuals will make sure guests receive a yellow Guest Card, which provides them basic information; the cards are perforated, allowing them to tear off half of it to return their contact information to us. The Pew Ambassadors are also assigned to give out the appropriate Guest Gifts.

There are certain gifts handed out to all first-time guests, and another gift handed out to second-time guests. As always, Pew Ambassadors should *not* be the only ones welcoming guests and introducing themselves. This is a duty of EVERYONE who attends worship. Pew Ambassadors, though, are here to supplement our collective efforts and make sure the logistical things are sought after.

VANCO

Giving Electronically

If you are *not* yet giving electronically to our church's ministry, you should consider this for the 2024 year. We use the company called "Vanco Payments," the #1 Church Giving Service in the U.S. Vanco lets you express generosity year-round by making it easy to set up recurring giving in a secure way. More than half of our weekly offering arrives electronically, withdrawn directly from your bank account.

It is very safe and easy to use!

How to Set Up My Recurring Electronic Giving

You can either fill out the <u>paper form</u> found on the welcome tables just inside the sanctuary and return it to the offering plate. Our financial secretary will take care of the rest.

OR...YOU CAN REGISTER YOURSELF.

Here's how:

- (1) Go to peumc.org.
- (2) Choose the "Donate" tab at the top of the page. OR click here: VANCO Payments.
- (3) Find the maroon section that says, "Create Your Online Profile." Click on "Create Profile."
- (4) You will need to input your basic information (name, email, address, phone) and create a password.

 REMEMBER YOUR PASSWORD! (The church does not have access to your password.)
- (5) Choose "Create Profile."
- (6) You will need to create a "New Scheduled Transaction." Use their options to set up your recurring payment.

What if I forgot my Vanco password?

Follow steps (1) and (2) from the section above. In the maroon section titled "Log In," choose "Forgot your Email Address or Password?"

SEE BILL PARKS if you forgot both email address AND password!

How Do I Update My Recurring Electronic Giving?

To raise or lower your existing recurring scheduled transaction, please log in to your VANCO Payments account.

A new giving amount or change in frequency will require either

- (I) a NEW scheduled transaction OR
- (II) you must EDIT your existing scheduled transaction.
- (I) NEW Scheduled Transaction Click on the option "Add Transaction." You can put in your latest information, plus the appropriate start date. HOWEVER, you will eventually need to delete your OLD Schedule Transaction. Unfortunately, you cannot schedule it to end on a certain date. Deleting a transaction ends it immediately.
- (II) EDIT existing Scheduled Transaction Click on the option "Edit" on your current Scheduled Transaction. Here, you can make your changes. Changes, however, take effect immediately.

^{**} Both option (I) and (II) require changes to be inputted at the time of the desired change. Thus, if you plan on changing your giving plan starting January 1st (or by the first Sunday of 2023), you will need to make these changes between your last 2022 giving and your first in 2023.

God's Way of Leading - Oct. 22nd, 29th, Nov. 5th

The history of God's Chosen People is filled with good and bad leaders. God chose **David** to shepherd all of Israel; David ended up being an example of a flawed, but faithful servant leader (1 Samuel 1 & 16, 10/22). However, his son, **Solomon**, would end up less faithful; he rejected advice to become a servant leader, which would lead to a split in the kingdom (1 Kings 6-8, 10/29). After the kingdom was divided, **Elijah's** leadership would prove that God is the one true Lord by sending fire from heaven (1 Kings 18, 11/5).

Reign of Christ Sunday - Sunday, November 5th

Is it appropriate for Christians committed to democratic forms of government to refer to God as a King?

Nevertheless, there *are* characteristics of God that cannot be explained using democratic metaphors (God isn't a president elected by the people):

- (1) God, unlike earthly rulers, is evenhanded and can be trusted completely. With God, there is no abuse of power, no compromising with injustice, no secret "backdoor deals" or oppressive tactics.
- (2) The righteousness of God cannot be altered or voted out by the whims of the people.
- (3) Divine justice ultimately has its way, no matter how long that may seem to take or how great our difficulty in believing that it will occur.

Talking about the reign of God makes truly clear the deficiencies of human rulers and provides clues as to what might make human governance more just. This Sunday devoted to the reign of Christ enables us to grasp more fully the Advent promise of the One who shall be called "the Prince of peace" and presses upon us the need to "seek peace and pursue it" (1 Peter 3:11). This observance points to the end of time when the kin'dom of Jesus will be established in all its fullness to the ends of the earth, an appropriate transition into the season that anticipates Christ's second coming.

We have more than a baby Jesus at Christmas; we have a sovereign Christ.

A musical journey through the Church Year will open our worship on that Sunday.

OUR JIN, GOD'S FAITHFULNESS - NOV. 12TH, 19TH, & 26TH

The Israelite Kingdom is now divided! Both the Northern Kingdom of Israel and the Southern Kingdom of Judah disobeyed God's Torah. Instead of loving God with all they had, they worshipped other gods. Instead of loving their neighbors, the powerful oppressed the powerless. However, God never stopped loving the people and kept calling them back from their disobedience (Hosea 11, 11/12). God expected justice from the people but saw injustice, and so God allowed the people to experience the consequences of their sin. God did not stop there but promised to send a righteous leader to help them (Isaiah 5 & 11, 11/19). Yet again, God promises that destruction is always followed by redemptive restoration (Micah, 11/26).


THANKSGIVING SERVICE
