FLEVATOR UPDATE


Our project is complete!

Our project finished within our projected budget! The cost did not just include the elevator itself and the tower that houses it, but also new floor tiles and ceiling tiles in 3 rooms in the Lower Level (including new lighting), and well as a new entry into the Memorial Lounge. The total cost was approx. \$410,000.00. We continue to be very appreciative of the \$300,000 contribution from the Alexander Family Foundation!

What about the elevator itself? Our new elevator is a standard one, and while it is nothing "fancy" or "top of the line," it still features some of the newest technology. Some of this technology is challenging even for the OTIS maintenance crew. Since the November bazaar, the elevator has been having issues "shutting down." Now, nobody has been stuck inside the elevator yet; it shuts down after it has been resting for a while. As a safety feature, an error code to the main system shuts the machine down. OTIS has made many trips to the church to work on it since its installation, trying to understand what is causing the error code. These problems are well beyond the scope of the church trustees, and OTIS is working tirelessly to understand what is going on. There is not much that can be said about this, except this: each day, OTIS is switching out components and going piece-by-piece through the whole system. This work is completely in OTIS's hands right now, as we are in that initial period where it is OTIS's responsibility to get it working.

We apologize for the inconveniences this may be causing. As surely as the sun rises in the east and sets in the west, there will come a day when that elevator functions exactly as we want it to! Until then, we will do our best to keep you updated with this project.

Correction from the article in last month's newsletter: The "call" button inside the elevator does *NOT* call 9-1-1; it calls the OTIS's 24/7 customer service. They will call for help in case someone gets stuck.


Gifts to Baby Jesus

BUDGET DISCUSSION, PART 2 OF 3

"Being, and making, disciples of Christ to transform our community and the world!"

In December's newsletter, we reviewed our budgeted MINISTRY OPPORTUNITIES for 2024. This month, we are reviewing our UTILITIES EXPENSES (property, church utilities, parsonage utilities). Below is a breakdown of that portion. Utilities are 26.6% of the total budget. NOTE: this includes minor/regular maintenance; not significant/emergency repairs. There is a separate Trustees fund to help cover the cost of such unexpected repairs (new dishwasher, minor roof repair, stone sealing, etc.) (My annotations are in red.)

Snow Removal/Mowing Service.....\$ 3,000.00 S&S Snow Removal Service (based in Port Edwards) is with whom we are contracting. This is our first year

General Maintenance......\$ 6,000.00

with them. For this winter, our agreement is \$65 to plow the parking lot each time (extra, if we ask for salt). \$75 to shovel the sidewalks (the sidewalk around the entire block). They will ONLY come if it snows 2 inches or more, and only after it stops snowing. However, our Maintenance Technician, Jeff, will try to always make sure the area nearest the main entrance is shoveled and de-iced for our worship services. We use a mixture of salt and sand. Additionally, while our summer mowers are all volunteers, all maintenance to our two lawn mowers, snow blower, leaf blower, weed eater, and gas is taken from this

For all parsonage-related maintenance. (Just for clarification, to those who are new to this, the parsonage is the church-owed home of the pastor and family; maintenance [including landscaping, appliances, and general maintenance and upkeep), is the responsibility of the church trustees).

Elevator Contract......\$ 2,400.00

The State of Wisconsin requires maintenance contracts for all businesses with an elevator. Our contract will technically start in November of 2024, as we are given a 1-year period of maintenance covered by OTIS. While we will not be spending the full \$2,400.00 in 2024, this does reflect a typical year (\$200 a month for a medium-level maintenance contract that will cover a monthly inspection and basic equipment repairs).

Our utilities were adjusted according to our projected 2024 increase in costs, but they still reflect reality. Our 2022 budget was very close to our budgeted projections. Our Communications includes several phone lines and internet throughout the building. We no longer have Solarus cable boxes at the church. Our Fire Protection Free covers the required annual inspection of the village by the local fire department, and the inspection of our fire extinguishers by Summit Fire Protection.

Our utilities were adjusted according to our projected 2024 increase in costs, but they still reflect reality. Our 2022 budget was very close to our budgeted projections. Annual Conference Standing Rules require churches to cover the cost of cable, phone, and internet in the parsonage for the pastor's use. In lieu of cable, the church pays for the standard cost of Hulu for \$216 a year; in lieu of a landline phone (this was removed in 2021), the church reimburses the pastor \$720 annually for the use of his cellphone for business purposes. The internet is \$780 annually and is separate from the church's internet.

A METHODIST LEADER'S QUEST TO TRANSFORM KOREAN HISTORY

on Aug. 31 at the Ambassador Hotel and Kwanglim Methodist Church in Seoul, South Korea. Jung said, "Love can bring pain and make it difficult for us, but we must still love and forgive."

Hailing from Kanghwa Island, a place whose very shores face the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ), the stark boundary that has divided the Korean Peninsula for decades, Jung shared a visceral understanding that everything should be peaceful. "The Korean diaspora scattered around the world has lived with a longing for their hometown and a deep nostalgia

for a hometown they cannot return to due to division," Jung reflected.

"In the recent White House rally and prayer event, we, as representatives of the Korean diaspora, intensified the unified appeal for a peace agreement. Our goal was to spotlight the conclusion of the 70-year ceasefire and galvanize the involvement of churches in both Korea and the United States, specifically The United Methodist Church and Presbyterian Church (USA), to actively contribute to the ongoing pursuit of peace in Korea, "shared Jung.

Driven by a profound belief that peace is not only a regional imperative but a global necessity, Jung has taken on multiple leadership roles, serving as the president of the General Board of Global Ministry, chair of the United Methodist Korean National Plan, and a member of the Ecumenical Forum for Korea in Geneva, Switzerland.

"God wants peace on the Korean Peninsula, and for world peace, peace on the Korean Peninsula must be achieved," Jung emphasized.

For Jung, the peace movement is more than just strategic planning. "In prayer, we can transform division and refrain from demonizing our sisters and brothers in the North. Through prayer, we can nurture hope despite the heightened tensions on the Korean Peninsula. Expressing solidarity with the Korean churches in our prayers strengthens our contribution to the ecumenical efforts for permanent peace in Korea," he said.

Against the backdrop of the 70th anniversary of the Korean Armistice Agreement, Jung reflected on the fourth Korean Methodist Church-United Methodist Church-World Methodist Council roundtable, a gathering that saw Methodists from around the world standing shoulder-to-shoulder in solidarity and prayer. The focus: enhancing the church's contribution Methodist peacebuilding process in the region. "We monitor and persuade our church to be responsive, enhancing the normalization of U.S. and North Korea relationships," Jung shared. He underscored the importance of advocacy, networking, and active engagement to remove obstacles hindering humanitarian aid, emphasizing a commitment to peaceful processes.

For Jung, the Korean diaspora is not just a scattered community but a testament to resilience, survival, and a relentless pursuit of peace. Through rallies and prayers, the Korean diaspora amplifies its

collective call for a peace agreement, transforming its history into a powerful force for change. "Division and conflict were their reality, and it remained as an indelible wound and trauma. So peace on the Korean Peninsula is the face of a mother and the warm hearts of brothers. Now, from a place of anticolonialism and new equality and human rights, we are discussing peace on the Korean Peninsula. It can be said to be a very existential and primordial place of faith," shared Jung.

Jung emphasized the divine calling to foster global peace, reflecting on the historic Tozanso process of 1984 led by the World Council of Churches. The urgent mission of the church, amid the pressing global migration crisis, is underscored, addressing the plight of over 70 million displaced individuals. He drew attention to the harsh realities of ongoing conflicts, citing the Gaza Strip and the Russia/Ukraine war, highlighting the necessity of prayer in response.

As Jung envisions a future where the church becomes a healing force and a beacon of peace, his story unfolds as a narrative woven with threads of faith, prayers, and a collective call for reconciliation. "I am grateful that churches and NGOs around the world are supporting this and praying and joining in as an urgent path to peace. In particular, the strong participation and solidarity of the World Council of Churches serves as an indicator not only for the Korean church but also for many Christians who pray for peace on the Korean Peninsula," said Jung.


our midweek Lenten services. What, when, and where is still TBD.



- 1. **Prayer Vigil Review** November 11th, 2023. We accidentally scheduled it at the same location as the Veteran's event but were able to borrow their sound system. We had a short prayer service immediately following the Veterans' Day service at the Veterans Park in downtown Rapids. A handful of people stayed. Charge Conference '23 Minutes

Port Edwards United Methodist Church Date: Thursday, December 14th, 2023 @ 6:00 PM

Presiding Elder: Rev. Tim O'Brien, St. Paul's-The Springs United Methodist Church, Stevens Point, WI

Present (in person-Fellowship Hall): Rev. Caleb McGregor, Kathy McGrath, Leo & Sue Thomasgard, Bill Lindroth, John & Diane Sweat, Bob Berg, Skip Mazurek, and Rev. Tim O'Brien.

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 PM by Presiding Elder, Rev. Tim O'Brien. The first order of business was to elect a secretary for the meeting. Sue Thomasgard was nominated. Diane Sweat made a motion to elect Sue as secretary, and Kathy McGrath seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Pastor Tim O'Brien offered an opening prayer.

- We watched the message from Bishop Jung on YouTube. He talked about the "Beloved Initiative," which is the mission
 to empower the churches to reach out to their congregations and communities and make an effort to be inclusive,
 welcoming everyone, and work together to carry out John Wesley's directives.
- 2. Pastor Caleb spoke about the "Safer Sanctuaries" book which talks about what all the churches need to do to make their facilities safe for everyone. A motion was made by Bill Lindroth and seconded by Kathy McGrath to accept the initiatives put forward in this book. Motion passed.
- 3. S-PRC chair, Sue Thomasgard, presented Pastor Caleb's financial package to the group. His 2024 salary will be \$51,600, which is a 3.2% cost of living increase. A motion was made by Bill Lindroth and seconded by Kathy McGrath to accept the financial package as presented. The Pastoral Compensation Package for 2024 was unanimously approved. These numbers can be found both on the "Staff-Parish Relations Committee Report" and reflected in the 2024 budget.
- 4. We looked at the Parsonage Checklist. Everything there is good, and the water report was also good. We will need to compile a list of all the appliances, their model numbers, and ages.
- 5. Trustees chair, Leo Thomasgard, talked about the church's insurance. The cost of the insurance will go up by about \$3,000, partly due to the installation of an elevator. Church Mutual has added an exclusion for wind and water damage. The choice is to pay about \$2,000 for a rider on the insurance or to be responsible for 1% of the total evaluation of the property (\$7.4 million), which amounts to \$74,000. The obvious choice was made to pay for the rider to cover wind and hail damage. [AMENDED: this amount will be even higher, according to new figures]
- 6. Pastor Caleb reported that we have lost 6 members through death and 5 people withdrew their **membership**. We added 2 new members, and we have had several people who have been coming lately and may join in the future. He commented that our church seems to be the most "well-connected" church in our area.
- 7. Pastor Caleb explained that his housing allowance for 2024 will be \$0, because Pastor Caleb's husband, Pastor Doug, will continue receiving a housing allowance from the Marshfield Wesley UMC. A motion was made by Sue Thomasgard and seconded by Diane Sweat to accept the housing allowance as presented. Motion carried. The 2024 Resolution on Furnishings Allowance for the pastor was unanimously approved for \$0.
- 8. We went over the Accountable Reimbursements for the pastor. A motion was made by Sue Thomasgard and seconded by Diane Sweat to accept the accountable reimbursement plan as presented. Motion carried. The 2024 Accountable Reimbursement Plan (ARP) for the pastor was unanimously approved for \$4,300. To the IRS, this is all one lump sum, but the 4 parts of the ARP are broken down as: Mileage: \$1,000 / Continuing Education: \$1,000 / Professional Expenses: \$1,500 / Annual Conference & School for Ministry Expenses: \$800. For tax purposes, these numbers must be approved before the start of the year. These numbers can be found both on the "Staff-Parish Relations Committee Report" and reflected in the 2024 budget.
- 9. We are granted <u>TWO</u> Lay Members to Annual Conference, but we currently don't have any. [AMENDED: Diane & John Sweat will be our Lay Members]
- 10. The only changes to church committees were the replacement of Lucy Silvester by Judy Miller as the Outreach/Missions Team Coordinator, the replacement of LuAnn Slattery by Midge Herschleb as the SPRC Vice Chair, and the additions of

- Rose Wirtz and Tiara Grunden to the Witness Team. A motion was made by Bob Berg and seconded Bill Lindroth to accept the leadership report as presented. Motion carried. The **2024 Leadership Roster** was approved.
- 11. The final item was the 2024 budget. The total budgeted expenses for 2024 are \$228,936.53. A motion was made by Bill Lindroth and seconded by Sue Thomasgard to accept the 2024 Budget as presented. PEUMC's 2024 Church Budget was unanimously approved.

With no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:15 PM.

Pat McGrath has suggested we host a "Bears-and-Brats" meal next year.


