March-April Bimonthly Mission Project

The Family Center – Wisconsin Rapids

GOAL: FILL 20 BAGS OF UNDERSIZE/TRAVEL-SIZE

HOUSEHOLD/HYGIENE PRODUCTS

Our missional goal is to completely fill 20 "Sendoff Bags." These bags will be given to clientfamilies at the time they leave the Family Center program and enter permanent housing for the first time. Many of these clients do not have the initial household and hygiene products necessary to start a new life in a place of their own. So, these bags will be something like practical "housewarming baskets."

The following list is a suggestion:

- □ garbage bags □ dish soap □light bulbs □ batteries (all sizes) □ laundry detergent **□** sponges **general cleaning items** □ towels (hand, bath, dish)
- □ toothbrushes
- □ toothpaste
- paper towels
- □ toilet paper
- □ shampoo
- □ body wash
- □ etc.

What we've collected so far (updated 3/27): 16 – rolls of toilet paper

- 89 Individual trash bags
- 9 dish/kitchen towels
- 5 small toothpastes
- 4 laundry detergent packets
- 1 4-pack bulbs
- 1 4-pack AA batteries
- 4 SOS pads
- 2 All-Purpose cleaner
- 1 bottle of shampoo
- 2 kitchen brushes

- 8 dish scrubs 3 – large toothpaste
- 1 2-pack bulbs
- 1 4-pack AAA batteries
- 2 dish detergents
- 1 2-pack toothbrushes
- 1 bottle of conditioner
- 1 hand soap

NOTE:

- All items should be undersized or travel-size. Laundry detergent could be a handful of pods or individual packets, for instance. These items must fit in a tote bag. Size of bag TBD.
- Bring these items to the church sooner than later so that we can monitor the progress and keep you updated!
- All money collected will be given directly to The Family Center and will not be allocated to purchase "Sendoff" items.
- You do not need to fill up an entire bag yourself. We are compiling all donations, filling the bags ourselves.

PASTOR CALEB TO ATTEND GENERAL CONFERENCE

Pastor Caleb's application has been accepted as a "marshal" for the worldwide gathering of United Methodists—something that only takes place once every 4 days. The 2020 cancelled General Conference was supposed to meet in Minneapolis, MN, but was cancelled for obvious pandemic reasons.

The G.C. is made up of delegates, around 800, that represent all the various regions of the *Connexion*. They will pass legislation and cast a strategic plan for the next 4 years. The delegates are 50% clergy and 50% lay person (like yourselves)!

I will not be able to vote while there, as I am not a delegate; but as a marshal, I will be given duties that will help make the two-week-long gathering function.

RAMA de RAM

The 2024 General Conference will take place in Charlotte, North Carolina.

The U.M.C. has no pope or president. No bishop to rule them all. Only a legislative body of delegates that attend a gathering once every 4 years. These delegates are elected new each time. One prominent individual stated that the United Methodist Church only ever exists during the two weeks these delegates meet. At the close of the session, the UMC ceases to exist except through the shared covenant that binds us by the *Book of Discipline*.

I, Pastor Caleb, will be gone for the full duration of G.C. - <u>April 22nd through May 3rd</u>.

The U.M.C. Structure (FYI)

from Rev. Jeremy Smith's 'Hacking Christianity' blog site.

The worldwide level of The United Methodist Church is structured like the U.S. Government with three branches:

- The Legislative Branch is the **General Conference**, a deliberative body that typically convenes every four years to write the polity of The UMC for the next four years.
- The Executive Branch is the **Bishops and the General Agencies / Commissions** that put into practice the polity of The UMC and govern the UMC in between General Conferences.
- The Judicial Branch is the **Judicial Council**, a review entity that determines answers when the written polity and the actual practices of the UMC are in conflict or unclear.

What Happens Now: General Conference 2024

At this time four years ago, United Methodists were gearing up for a tough slog of a Conference—[but] now, the feeling is *far* more congenial and collaborative across the aisle. *What has changed?*

The exit of most Traditionalist delegates and the advancement or election of progressive or centrist reserve delegates turned what was already a majority in the USA into a supermajority in America. This allows for a better chance at alignment across the worldwide United Methodism on structure and principles, even if practices will continue to be different; and with a clearer relationship between USA churches and African churches—many things are [now] possible.

#1: Regionalization goes Worldwide: United Methodism is a Global Church. However, our church structure reflects our colonial past, with unequal decisionmaking and accountability. Regions outside the USA (called 'Central Conferences') have far more permission to make local changes [and adapt parts of the *Book of Discipline*] than the USA, and those same regions at General Conference must sit through days of polity discussions and privileges that are USA-centric. To remedy these wrongs, Central Conference voices have been involved in efforts to right those unjust structures, which is called **'regionalization'**: flattening the church hierarchy by creating and allowing all geographic regions to operate united in mission but contextual in practice.

The hurdles? 2/3 of GC2024 delegates must approve the legislation, and a subsequent 2/3 ratification by all Annual Conferences must support what would be a constitutional amendment.

#2: Revise the Social Principles: The revised Social Principles were developed over several years and across several General Conferences, with the General Board of Church and Society holding dozens of conversations globally to craft these new principles.

#3: Remove Harmful Language: LGBTQ+ United Methodists are not fully included in the life of the church, as full membership, clergy orders, and marriage support are excluded by name in our polity. Multiple efforts will take place this year to remove those exclusions. Only 50% + 1 of the delegates need to support changing our polity.

General Conference of the U.M.C.

Who makes decisions for The United Methodist Church if there is no one person in charge? *Good question.* The only body that can set official policy, make changes to our *Books of Discipline* and *Resolutions*, and speak on behalf of the entire denomination is the General Conference. General = global.

Statement from U.S. Delegates

This statement is part of ongoing collaborative work among a coalition of U.S. delegates who share the goals named within.

We hope that the gathering in Charlotte, NC, will bear witness to a more perfect way of faithful service to Christ, who "makes all things new and reconciles all people unto himself" [2 Corinthians 5:16-20]. As our portion of the Church commences a prolonged period of healing, reconciliation, and rebuilding, we have engaged in ongoing conversations and reflection with United Methodists from around the world to discern what changes we might make as a general Conference that might strengthen unity amidst diversity and allow enough flexibility for our various geographical regions to thrive. As a result of these conversations and with a spirit of humility, we share the following endorsements with all General Conference delegates.

Worldwide Regionalization: We support *[the creation of]* distinct regional governing bodies in Africa, Europe, the Philippines, and the U.S. These proposed changes would expand the ability of regions outside the U.S. to adapt portions of the UM *Book of Discipline*, and, for the first time, give the U.S. this same authority. We support this legislation because we are committed to great self-determination and self-governance; we also believe that expanding regional decision-making will allow annual conferences within each region to thrive.

The Revised Social Principles: We support the adoption of the Revised Social Principles as a muchneeded restatement of our fundamental moral and social commitments as United Methodists. Commissioned by the 2012 General Conference, the newly revised Social Principles fulfill their mandates to be more globally relevant, theologically and biblically grounded, and succinct. The revised Social Principles provide a timely opportunity for reaffirming who we are as United Methodists.

Removal of Exclusionary Policies: We support the removal of all provisions in the UM *Book of Discipline* regarding the participation of gays and lesbians in The United Methodist Church. Removing the current language will create a new starting place for dialogue and learning. It will also remove a significant stumbling block to engaging all people in the ministries of the Church, particularly for local congregations and annual conferences ready to welcome LGBTQ+ people *[in every level of the church]*.

We hope that passing these vital pieces of legislation will strengthen our worldwide fellowship, foster greater unity in the midst of diversity, and ensure that many years hence, United Methodists worldwide will still be able to proclaim that we are one body serving one Lord of all.

Upcoming Trustees Project

- Finalize the moisture issue in the Fellowship Hall/Memorial Lounge. These corners have had interior moisture issues that have damaged the paint. This is being caused by rainwater running down the metal caps of the roof parapet and dropping off around the corners. Sandstone can be very porous. Sealant was applied to areas around each of the exterior corners of the F.H./M.L. Next, small gutters will be installed to collect & drain the rainwater away from the stone corners. El Crider will be repainting these corners soon.
- Fix front lawn damaged by elevator equipment. Ben Martinson of the Village Public Works crew has graciously offered to fix the sidewalk himself. But the lawn, including sections of the sprinkler system, will need to be fixed as spring approaches.
- \circ $\,$ Six problematic spots on the roof will be addressed in a more permanent way.
- The ceiling of the vestibule (outside the sanctuary) and the tower room (old main entry) will be replaced. Leaks from snow/rain blown into the bell tower has caused water damage to these ceilings.
- The foyer floor will be replaced with carpet squares. <u>This will be our congregational fundraiser</u>. Prices are still TBD.
- Portraits of our past ministers will return to the Memorial Lounge.



Two new palm bushes and two new olive trees will soon be framing our high altar.

The two palm bushes are in memory of **Kathy Sweet**. Kari, her daughter, shared how much Kathy saw palm branches as spiritual objects. Each year, Kathy would take her Palm-Passion Sunday palm branch home and stick it behind the portrait of her late son, Michael.

The two olive trees are in memory of **Roger Sweet**. Olives represent strength and victory and have long been associated with Greek & Roman athleticism. Olive trees can represent eternal life since they can grow to be very old. One of the oldest known olive trees in the world is 4,000 and still producing fruit!

Both palms and olives have biblical significances and are very appropriate for our altar area!

The two silk trees that previously adorned the chancel area will either be retired or placed in another location. If you know who donated these trees, please let us know!
