

Summer Sermon Series #1:

Our Wesleyan Discipleship: The Way of Grace

The Rev. John Wesley prescribed some ways we can put ourselves in positions to receive God's grace. These ways were called the "means of grace," and are things we do to grow toward a "holiness of heart and life," or what Wesley called a 'mature faith.' John Wesley strived to keep a balanced faith—joining the heart and the brain—the inward and outward—the personal and social—the grace of God and our good works. This sermon series will journey through the four basic categories of the "means of grace": acts of worship (5/19), devotion (6/26), compassion (6/2), and justice (6/9). By participating in the means of grace, we put ourselves in spaces—physically, mentally, and spiritually—that open us up to allow God to fill us. 'The Way of Grace' is how we make room for the Holy Spirit to work on our hearts and lives!

WRESTLING WITH DOUBT: A QUESTIONING HEART

Everyone has doubts. Where is God when bad things happen? Does God hear our prayers? Is there really a heaven? How can we know? Whether you're a longtime Christian or someone brand new to faith, this sermon series will lead you to trust in God that is unafraid of hard questions. Together, we will wrestle with doubt while finding faith—honoring trust over certainty, and embracing mystery over simple answers. This series is based on The Rev. Adam Hamilton's newest book of the same name.

Adam Hamilton is the founding pastor of The United Methodist Church of the Resurrection in Leawood (Kansas City), Kansas, one of the fastest growing, most highly visible churches in the country. *The Church Report* named Hamilton's congregation the mot influential mainline church in America.

August Sermon Series:

HOPE FOR HARD TIMES: THE END OF OUR ROPE

We've all been there: Rock bottom. At the end of our rope. The last straw. During such times, it often seems like the only option is to throw in the towel. Based on the book by The Rev. Magrey R. deVega, we will examine the lives of the two great Old Testament prophets, Elijah and Elisha, to reveal their consistent message to us: Don't give up! Don't lose hope! Trust that God will help you find a way. There is hope for you in hard times. Your story of hurt, heartache, and hopelessness has been heard, and God has a message for you. We will also be touching upon such significant live experiences like: Grieving the Loss of Your Spouse; Living with Dementia; Empty Nesters and Loneliness; Depression.

- COMPLETED: Al Crider has repainted the interior corners of the Lounge and Fellowship Hall. These
 corners receive the worst moisture issue. Now that the outside has been sealed, the insides were
 ready to be painted, and he did a wonderful job!

- **PARTIALLY COMPLETED:** Sinks in the Lower-Level rooms. The A.A. room (former storage/classroom) is completed. The nursery and Sunday School room will be receiving sinks and cabinetry soon.

New Ceilings Installed.

New ceilings were installed in the old man entry ("tower room") and outside the sanctuary ("vestibule"). With new LED lighting, each space is now lit with brighter, livelier light.









It will be mostly singing, and the only devotional will be based on the hymns that we sing. We will conclude with prayer time.

A Pastoral Letter from the E.L.C.A. to the U.M.C.

5/8/2024 Dear Church,

In 1 Corinthians 12:26 the apostle Paul reminds us that *"if one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it."* For 15 years, we have accompanied our **Full-Communion siblings in the United Methodist Church (UMC) through joyous and challenging times. We know firsthand the pain of debate, disaffiliation, and division that they have experienced. Yet we also know the hope-filled renewal of Christ's Church.

Last week the UMC General Conference, postponed since 2020, concluded in Charlotte, N.C. With each day's news we witnessed our partner church emerging strengthened, revitalized, and united. Several actions will shape the future of the UMC. These include the adoption of a plan for worldwide regionalization to restructure the UMC as a truly equitable, diverse, and global church, which now goes to annual conferences for ratification. Regionalization will allow for unity within the worldwide UMC structure, even as members hold diverse opinions on the following actions:

- Lifting a 40-year ban on the ordination of practicing homosexual clergy.
- Lifting restrictions on clergy to officiate at, and on congregations to host, weddings between adults of the same gender.
- Eliminating from the UMC's Social Principles the assertion that homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching.
- Broadening the definition of marriage to be between either a man and a woman or two consenting adults.

The UMC welcomed over 70 ecumenical guests, who were present when the conference adopted a proposal for Full Communion with The Episcopal Church (TEC); this now awaits action by the TEC General Convention. Worship included a postponed celebration of Full Communion with the Moravian Church in America (Northern and Southern provinces), ratified in 2018, and a sermon titled "CHRISTIAN UNITY MATTERS," preached by the Rev. Dr. Jerry Pillay, general secretary of the World Council of Churches.

These significant actions and the UMC's witness to the ecumenical vocation we share come as we celebrate 15 years of Full Communion. The ELCA rejoices and gives thanks to God for the opportunity to proclaim together, from this point forward, that Christian teaching is for all people and that the gifts of all are welcome and needed to serve Christ's church.

****Full Communion** is not a merge, but when two denominations develop a relationship based on shared profession of the Christian faith, mutual recognition of baptism, and sharing of the Lord's Supper. These denominations may worship together, exchange clergy, and share a commitment to evangelism, witness, and service in the world. Each entity agrees that even with differences, there is nothing that is church-dividing.

Elevator Lights

Some have pointed out that it appears that someone keeps forgetting to turn off the lights around the elevator. You can see them on through the windows when walking/driving by the front of the church. Actually, by state law, each entry to an elevator must have 24/7 lighting. Thus, you will see a light turned on on each of our three levels. In fact, don't try to turn them off, because they are hard-wired in without a switch.

Historic Day in the Life of The United methodist Church

On the final day of a General Conference eight years in the making — the Rev. Gary Graves, General Conference secretary, referred to it as "the multipurpose 2020 *and* 2024" meeting — delegates set the budget that will fund the ministries of the denomination for the next four years, a budget significantly lower than the one it set in 2016.

It could be argued that this was the most consequential General Conference since the 1968 assembly that created The United Methodist Church. The church going forward from here is different than it was just a few weeks ago. Not all agree with the more inclusive stance the delegates took, but the passage of worldwide regionalization ensures all may continue ministry in their own context while remaining part of the connection.

Church leaders are already looking at how members can remain united despite having different views, and delegates created a path for churches that have left the denomination to return in the future.

The votes that changed the church's stance on sexuality may have garnered the most attention, but they were not the only actions taken in Charlotte.

During the 10 days, delegates considered 2,000 petitions. Among other actions, they approved a new retirement plan for clergy, granted deacons authority to offer Holy Communion and conduct baptisms in their ministry setting, celebrated church milestones, agreed to a full communion relationship with the Episcopal Church, and approved the departure of four Eurasian (Russia, Belarus, Kyrgyzstan, and Kazakhstan) annual conferences that plan to become the autonomous Christian Methodist Church, while retaining the remaining two annual conferences of that region (Ukraine and Moldova).

Drawing the assembly to a close with a centering moment after presiding over the final plenary session, Bishop Tracy S. Malone told everyone gathered:

"As you go forward from this General Conference, tell the world about Jesus. As you go, tell them about His love. As you go, be love. ... Let's walk together, beloved, and let us never grow weary of doing the work of the kin-dom."

GC delegates pass budget, reduce number of US bishops

Delegates on May 3 approved a denominational budget with a bottom line that will vary by about \$20 million, depending on giving collection rates over the next two years.

By a vote of 647 to 31 (a 95% majority), this year's delegates approved a 2025-28 denominational budget of \$373.4 million. That total is contingent on collection rates being at 90% or more for the next two years. If giving is below that percentage, the budget bottom line will be \$353.6 million.

Reflecting the effect of the loss of a quarter of U.S. churches to disaffiliation, the budget will be between 38% and 41% lower than the one set by the 2016 General Conference.

Delegates also approved a plan for distributing 32 bishops across the U.S. — which represents a reduction from the 39 active bishops currently serving.



Bans removed on same-sex clergy, same-gender weddings, and LGBTQ+ funding

United Methodist pastors no longer face potential penalties for being in a same-sex relationship or officiating at same-sex weddings, nor can they be compelled to officiate one.

With the day's actions, the delegates removed decades of additions to the Book of Discipline, the denomination's policy book, creating restrictions aimed specifically at LGBTQ people. General Conference removed a longtime ban on "self-avowed practicing" gay clergy, eliminated a half-century-old statement against homosexuality, with a definition of marriage that now read: *"We affirm marriage as a sacred lifelong covenant that brings two people of faith into union with one another."* By a vote of 447 to 233, delegates struck down a ban, added by the 1996 General Conference, that prohibited clergy from officiating and churches from hosting "homosexual unions."

On May 2nd, the church's top legislative body on May 2, by a vote of 523 to 161, removed the denominational stance that declares homosexuality to be "incompatible with Christian teaching." That language has been in place since 1972. A similar policy that banned the Church from funding the advocacy and acceptance of homosexuality was overturned and replaced by a policy that encourages the church to support advocacy of the LGBTQ community.

During the afternoon session of General Conference's final day, delegates approved four changes to church law that together end remaining bans related to homosexuality and protect the rights of pastors to choose which weddings to perform or not to perform.

This marks the beginning of what many see as a new day for The United Methodist Church after decades of rancor over the place of LGBTQ people in the church. The United Methodist Church's condemnation of homosexuality—which sparked a half-century of conflict—is now no more.

Panelists look beyond General Conference

The decisions made at this General Conference are a "testimony" to The United Methodist Church, said Bishop Tracy S. Malone, president of the Council of Bishops. *"We are a church where everyone can belong,"* she said.

Removing condemning language on homosexuality opens the church to be in a worldwide conversation, said Greater Northwest Area Bishop Cedric D. Bridgeforth, adding that he hopes that local churches "will not grow weary in well-doing" because these decisions made at General Conference will call for a cultural shift and hard conversations.

'Get out of God's way,' bishop urges

Council of Bishops President and Resident Bishop of the East Ohio Conference, Tracy S. Malone,

asked delegates to imagine a United Methodist Church where hope is reborn, and where people



are reconciled to one another and committed to build God's beloved community.

"Let us imagine a church where no one, nobody, is marginalized," Malone said. "Let us imagine a church that transcends geography and cultures and languages and borders and barriers and differences. I'm talking about a beautiful mosaic that reflects the kin-dom, the kingdom of God."

Votes of note

• General Conference on April 30 approved via consent calendar a resolution asking that United Methodist institutions not buy government bonds from Israel, Turkey, and Morocco, given that those nations have engaged in long-term military occupations. The resolution comes amid pro-Palestinian protests on U.S. college campuses and after a demonstration at General Conference, decrying Israel's military operations in Gaza. Wespath, the church's pensions and investment agency, said it will carefully consider the non-binding measure.

• The majority of legislation supported by climate justice activists within The United Methodist Church was passed by General Conference on the consent calendar in the early part of its second week. Some of the petitions passed would direct churches to conduct annual audits of the carbon footprint of their buildings, grounds or facilities, encourage annual conference sessions to reduce energy waste and consumption, and update or readopt existing church resolutions on creation care.

How Does the General Conference "Work?"

Many of you have watched my Facebook videos while at General Conference in Charlotte, N.C. I learned a lot, too, and I wanted to share that knowledge with you. It's my opinion that people are more engaged when they have a grasp on how something as complex as the G.C. of our denomination works.

The General Conference is the official name of our "global gathering" which convenes once every four years to determine the denomination's future direction. Each annual conference elected their slate of delegates. 861 delegates were at this global gathering in Charlotte, N.C., representing each part of our world-wide denomination. (Someone described it as a mini-United Nations.) Half are clergy and half are laity—representing churches of every size and context. These delegates gather from all over the world to consider revisions to church law and the official ritual of the church, adopt resolutions on current moral, social, public policy and economic issues, and elect officers for a number of churchwide positions. The G.C. also approves plans and budgets for church-wide programs for the next four years.


The pieces of legislation (or "petitions") were gathered over this past year. But who can submit these petitions? The answer: **Any Profession Member of Any United Methodist Church!** This makes our denomination a "true" democracy—as opposed to the United States with is a "representative democracy," because most of the laws come from the lawmakers, not the people.

The delegates are the "Legislative Branch." The bishops are the "Executive Branch" and their only power is to lead the sessions of General Conference; they have voice but no vote. The Judicial Council—made up of clergy and laity—is, of course, the "Judicial Branch," and was on site to make rulings on the constitutionality of our legislative changes.

There were 1,099 pieces of legislation. These pieces of legislation were broken up into 14 legislative committees by subject matter: Ordained Ministry, Church and Society, Local Church, Conferences, Discipleship, etc. Each committee further subdivided themselves into sub-committees to handle all the petitions. The sub-committees sent back their recommendations to the committee.

Each committee voted to accept, accept with amendments, reject, or refer the various petitions. This was the work of the first week of G.C. These committees made it possible to review and provide recommendations on hundreds of petitions.

Petitions approved by the legislative committee move on for consideration by the full body of delegates ("plenary"). Delegates make decisions on the matters before them based on their own conscience as moved by the Holy Spirit. They do not represent anyone but themselves. Consent calendar items are voted on as a bundle without further debate to conserve precious floor time. The delegates used secure electronic voting devices to cast their secret ballots and to request recognition to address the assembly. Only the vote totals are recorded and reported. A simply majority passes most motions. Constitutional changes require a two-thirds majority of the delegates present and voting and subsequent approval by two-thirds of those voting at annual conferences the following year. The legislation, budget, and other items approved by the G.C. take effect at the beginning of the following year, unless specified to take effect at the close of G.C.
