OUR STORY

IN THE BEGINNING . . .

The first Methodist minister to be appointed to Port Edwards by the Annual Conference was Rev. John R. Reynolds, in 1894. For about 3 years, a small gathering of Methodists met in homes.

By 1898, the need for a new schoolhouse in the village was realized. The old schoolhouse was sold to Lewis Miller Alexander and Mrs. (John) Frances Jane Edwards for \$1,400. They, in turn, moved the building to the corner of Letendre Ave and Wisconsin River Drive. After enlarging it, adding a basement, and decorating the building, it was presented to the community as the first-ever ecumenical church building in town for all Christian groups.

It was known as the **Port Edwards Community Church.** This was in 1898.

Catholics, Lutherans, and Methodists took advantage of the chapel, each group conducting services in the church at different hours each Sunday morning. At this time, no minister of any denomination resided in Port Edwards; they came from either Wisconsin Rapids or Nekoosa.

The Methodist minister at the time of our charter was Rev. Frank A. Nimits.

From 1894-1951, Port Edwards shared a pastor with Grand Rapids. During the early years, they came to Port Edwards only once a month, and later, each week.

By 1910, the Catholics and Lutherans no longer worshipped in Port Edwards, as the new interurban rail line meant that they had

Ministers of Port Edwards UMC

Before 1951, our ministers served both the Grand Rapids (Wisconsin Rapids) and Port Edwards Methodist (Episcopal) Churches. First they came to Port Edwards once a month, and later each week. The Rev. Albert E. Tink was the first to be appointed full time to Port.

a convenient means of traveling to Rapids or Nekoosa to attend services. The chapel in Port Edwards was presented to the Methodists and was brought under the authority of the Wisconsin Annual Conference and became the **Community Methodist Church.**

In 1917, through a gift on the part of Lewis Miller Alexander, the church was enlarged, a used organ was acquired from Milwaukee, new pews were installed, and a stained-glass window made it really look like a church.

The Silent Bell

Our very active congregation of Methodists was happy with our little church, but on December 14th, 1946, we had a setback when our church was demolished by fire. A faulty oil burner was the cause. Intense heat was noted when choir members entered the building around 4:00 PM. Noting excessive heat in the chimney area, members carried water from the downstairs kitchen to help cool the chimney until the volunteer firemen arrived from Nekoosa. They fought the fire by pumping water from the river. As the fire attacked the steeple, the bell fell and sounded one final clang as it hit the ground. Then came silence and the feeling of sadness. While the ground floor was destroyed, the basement survived and it was roofed over, converting it into a sanctuary to be used until a new church could be built. Even after the current sanctuary was built, the basement continued to serve as a social hall for many years.



Rising from the Ashes

Ground broke for the present sanctuary on August 27th, 1948. The church, costing \$151,000, was dedicated in October 1949. A parsonage was added in 1960, costing \$32,000. The Rev. David Spear family was the first parsonage family to live at 40 Market Avenue, and a few years later an educational wing was added to the sanctuary, which cost \$185,570, and was dedicated in 1964.

In 1962, a small parking lot was added to the back of the church after a home was removed, later enlarged in 1992. A church newsletter was started in January 1964 by two church members. A library in the church was added in 1964. A Couples Club first met in May of 1964, bringing together couples of all ages for programs of interest, for activities, and for fellowship; in the 1970s, it became known as the Pairs and Spares. A Sunday School, Bible study, or discussion group has always been provided for the adults over the years. The church membership experienced a significant rise in the late 1960s. As a

result, pews, which could accommodate approximately 50 people, were added at the back of the sanctuary. During this same period, the Conrad Schmidt Studios of Milwaukee, who had made the original stained-glass windows over the high altar, created two new windows for the back of the sanctuary, in memory of Donald Lichty. A stained-glass window over the front door of the church was designed as a fitting tribute to the memory of Clarence and Harriet Jasperson.

In 1968, after the merger of the Evangelical United Brethren and The Methodist Church denominations, our local church followed suit and voted to renam ourselves the **Port Edwards United Methodist Church**.

When Mrs. Dorothy Brazeau Gallery died in 1974, she willed her property on the corner of Wisconsin River Drive and Market Avenue to the church. The house was sold and moved. With this addition of land, the church now owned the entire block #16 in the Village of Port Edwards. The interest from the Gallery Trust is used each year for education and missional purposes, according to Dorothy's request.

In 1981, the mortgage was paid off for the church & parsonage and the congregation was finally debt free! From the winter of 1987 to the summer of 1988, an extensive project of repair and revitalization was done to the church exterior, with interior work being done in January and February 1989, pews were removed and the stone was power washed.

Children and Youth

Sunday School often featured a music program each Sunday morning before the children were taken to their classes. There were sometimes up to five different classes for children grades 1 through 8. Summer church schools and VBS kept the children engaged during the summer. Children participated in the lighting of the Advent wreath, "hanging of the greens," Christmas and Easter programs, performances of Kids Praise, fundraising for missions, acolyte, and many studies on how the Bible relates to their own lives. Lately, the children of the community have enjoyed our community Easter Egg hunt held the day before Easter; this event has brought upwards to 100 children together!

Rev. Alpheus Triggs led the earliest known youth group, called the "Young Peoples." In the late 1940s, the Methodist Youth Fellowship (MYF) would meet at the church and sometimes would join with Wautoma and Wisconsin Rapids groups and attend district rallies.

In the 1970s, the youth did several activities to raise funds for mission trips. They traveled to such places as the Red Bird Mission School in Kentucky, poor neighborhoods in Nashville, and Antlers, Oklahoma.

The children of the church enjoyed their annual service projects like stocking the Family Center food pantry, making valentines for shut-ins, collecting vegetable seeds for missionaries, and giving gifts for the Christmas angel tree. Each year, the middle school youth would have a "Packers and Potatoes" fundraiser.

Musical Talent

Port Edwards is truly blessed to have such a fine array of musical talent. There have been senior, junior, and cherub choirs. The adults presented many cantatas. During 1964-68, the junior choir numbered almost 30 boys and girls! Dedicated organists and pianists have graced the congregation with their musical gifts. The handbell choir had their first performance on Christmas Eve of 1983, with seven ringers, eventually growing to 11. In 1985-86, a chimes group for children was formed. The bell choirs provided music on the

fourth Sunday of each month, as well as for holidays and special occasions. Performances around the area at other churches, organizations, and the malls built a positive reputation in the community for the music ministry of our church.



Missions and Outreach

Over the years, our church has participated in mission activities all over the world through our missional giving projects. In some cases, we visited sites directly, such as the Caribbean Island of Dominica, the Bahamas, Hawaii, Haiti, the Dominican Republic, and Appalachia. We have also participated in outreach work in our community by volunteering at the South Wood Emergency Pantry, the Family Center, FOCUS Neighbor Table, LOVE Inc., and Meals on Wheels. We have visited such places like Northcott Neighborhood House in Milwaukee, fed the hungry at The Gathering in Milwaukee, Harbor House in Superior, WI, and most recently, worked with Afghan refugees at Fort McCoy in Tomah, WI. There really isn't a charity or organization in the Rapids area for which we have not collected items or money over the years. Recently, this has included Mary's Place, Jeremiah's Crossing, Dove's Nest, and local school lunch debt programs.

A New Century

With no more street parking along Letendre Ave and Wisconsin River Drive, most people were in the habit of entering the facilities through the rear doors by the parking lot. In 2000, the congregation decided to reconstruct the "back entry" of the building, creating a new lobby and accessible restrooms. In 2013, a state-of-the-art sound system was installed in the sanctuary for better amplification and accessibility.

In 2017, the congregation voted, by 90% affirmation, to become a Reconciling Congregation; this vote was the result of many bible studies and conversations about the nature of human sexuality and our faith. Since that vote, our congregation has been at work learning about, and practicing, our welcome of, the LGBTQ+ community, including other marginalized people, like those with disabilities or are neurodivergent. Workshops are still being conducted to help the congregation become fully inclusive of all God's people!

In 2018, several downpours during a roof replacement caused massive damage to both floors of the educational wing. The majority of 2019 was consumed by emergency renovations. This led right into the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic, which caused all things to shut down for the better part of 18 months.

As the pandemic was slowly waning, discussions about the addition of an elevator had resurfaced. Serious discussions took place before the water damage. In the summer of 2023, work began on a \$410,000 OTIS elevator that would make the entire facilities accessible. The project was completed a day before the annual ladies' holiday bazaar on the first weekend of November!

In 2022, as the world, including the church, was investing heavily in their online presence, our media outreach was also extended by the installation of TVs in the sanctuary, a camera, and computer. With this setup, services could now be livestreamed to social media each week and the addition of five 48-inch TVs allowed for better visual aid during the service.

In Conclusion . . .

Lots of time has been spent telling the story of our buildings and grounds. Perhaps this is because construction, demolition, expansion, renovations, and destruction of church property always stick in the mind as major turning points that open and close chapters in the life of any congregation. But ours is *not* a history of *buildings*, neither is it a history of *events*.

Our history is a story of people.

This change is not just for aesthetics-sake, or ease of navigation, but ultimately for practical/legal reasons. We are now using MAILCHIMP to send our mass emails. MAILCHIMP helps keep our emails from entering people's junk folders or tagged as potential spam. Additionally, it is best practice for churches to follow the privacy law requiring businesses to include an "unsubscribe" option in the email. MAILCHIMP does this automatically.

"Unsubscribing" only affects the weekly email and does not remove your email address from our church database; we can still contact you via one-to-one email correspondence. Additionally, unsubscribing does not affect your membership status.

History of Pride Month

It all started on June 28th, 1969, a hot summer night in Greenwich Village, N.Y. Cops stormed the Stonewall Inn, arresting patrons and forcing them into waiting police vehicles. But a nearby crowd grew restless and angry, and eventually someone started whipping onlookers into fighting back. Confrontations continued over the next few nights. These demonstrations were not the first instance in American history when people fought back against a government-sponsored system that persecuted sexual minorities; but the Stonewall Riots became the defining event that marked the start of the "gay rights movement" in the U.S. and around the world.

Following the Stonewall Riots, organizers wanted to build on that spirit of resistance. The following year, they organized a march to Central Park and adopted the theme of "Gay Pride" as a counterpoint to the prevailing attitude of shame. Most Pride celebrations take place in June to mark the anniversary of the Stonewall Riots.

PEUMC heard from Lilyann her plans for after high school. She plans to go to The University of Wisconsin in Stevens Point to receive a science and psychology degree.



Online Giving Looks a Little Different

Go to **peumc.org/donate** and click on "**Donate Now**" to find the landing page for our online giving. This page looks a little different now. VANCO, our online giving portal, owns this and chooses to update the look of their page.

You can **sign up** for an account (good for recurring payment schedule) or **log in** to your existing account. Both are accessed at the top of the page (**green circle**).



As you can see from the photo on the left (below), you can give a one-time donation or set up a recurring payment plan (auto withdrawal from your bank account). One-time options are:

Once, now OR **once, at a later time** (you select date of transaction). Recurring options are: **weekly** OR **monthly.**

As you can see from the photo to your right, that the system requires only some basic information to set up an account with VANCO. However, to complete a transaction, you will need to do one of two things: insert your credit card information for one-time only donations OR insert your bank account information for recurring transactions. You can set up a recurring payment plan yourself online OR you can print a copy of the
