

The Incarnational Tradition: Discovering the Sacramental Life from Richard Foster, abridged by Pastor Caleb

We have examined the *prayer-filled* life of the **Contemplative Stream** that lays the foundation for both the *virtuous* life and the *Spirit-empowered* life of the **Holiness** and **Charismatic Streams** respectively, and how these give us the ability to engage in the *compassionate* life of the **Social Justice Stream** and the *proclamation* of the Good News of the Kin'dom of God through the **Evangelical Stream**. The one element remaining is to understand how all of these pieces function together in ordinary life.

The **Incarnational Stream** of Christian life and faith focuses upon making present and visible the realm of the invisible spirit. This *sacramental* way of living addresses the crying need to experience God as truly manifest and notoriously active in daily life.

HISTORIC EXAMPLE:

At Susanna's baptism, her father, Dr. Samuel Annesley, was asked how many children he had. He replied, "I think about two dozen or so, or maybe a quarter of a hundred." The last guess was the correct one: Susanna was the last of twenty-five children!

Susanna immersed herself in the details of daily life: finding God in the details and serving God through these same details. Susanna is like millions of others who have learned to do ordinary things with a perception of their enormous value. Later in life, she prayed, "Lord, help me to remember that religion is not to be confined to the church, or closet, nor exercised only in prayer and meditation, but that everywhere I am in Thy presence. So may my every word and action have a moral content. . . . May all the happenings of my life prove useful and beneficial to me. May all things instruct me and afford me an opportunity of exercising some virtue and daily learning and growing toward Thy likeness. . . . Amen." This prayer is one of the finest expressions of the Incarnational Tradition you will ever end.

Although she could not attend college, she received a substantial education at home. Her father, known for his intellectual acumen (M.A. and L.L.D. from Queen's College, Oxford) took an active part in her education. Under his tutelage, Susanna studied logic, metaphysics, anatomy, French, and possibly Greek and Latin. She has been called "a theologian in short dresses," and for good reason. By the time she was 13, she had carefully weighed the doctrinal debates between the Nonconformist (nondenominational) groups (her father was known as "the St. Paul of the Nonconformists") and the established Church of England and she decided in favor of Anglicanism, against her father's wishes. Still, she remained her father's favorite daughter.

Her husband, Samuel, never became well known – but two of her 19 children became among the most famous figures in all of England. I'm speaking of Charles and John Wesley. This is the story of Susanna Wesley – the Mother of Methodism.

Susanna was first and foremost a mother. For her, motherhood was a calling – a *vocation* – and she took up this work with a seriousness that is hard for people to comprehend today. The fact that she had 19 children in a span of twenty years is, by itself, difficult for us to wrap our modern minds around. Nine of these children did not survive infancy, but the remaining 10 received a loving care that was special even in that day. And training – did they ever receive! Susanna has received universal acclaim for the way she undertook to educate all of her children in a kind of "home schooling" environment. In essence, she ran her own private boarding school. All the children (7 girls & 3 boys) – on their 5th birthday were taught the entire alphabet in a day. And then they started immediately on the first chapter of Genesis. From there, the syllabus included grammar, history, mathematics, geography, and theology. Samuel, the father, helped occasionally with lessons in the classics.

Her teaching schedule went from 9 in the morning until noon and from 2 until 5 in the afternoon. Susanna kept up this 6-hour-a-day schedule for 20 years. Each day she would watch over her children doing their lessons, all the while nursing the newest baby, keeping the household accounts, writing her letters, doing her sewing. She also met individually with each child once a week. John's day was Thursday

nights, and all through his influential ministry he expressed his indebtedness for those Thursday night sessions with his mom.

Suffice it to say that she and her husband had their fair share of "calamities of life." But she endured. The secret of her endurance was a *faith* that could see everything in light of God's overriding governance for good, a *hope* that could carry her through the most difficult of circumstances, and a *love* that could overcome evil with good.

Susanna Wesley lived sacramentally in the most common ventures of life. The details of her living were the arena for her interaction with God and the place where she built a history with God.

BIBLICAL EXAMPLE:

Who embodies the **Incarnational Stream** above all else? The answer: **Jesus Christ**. Jesus is The Incarnation itself. Emmanuel: God with us. God visible and tangible to the world.

For another example, let us examine Exodus 31. Up to this point, God had been seen quite regularly: the people saw the cloud by day and pillar of fire by night, tablets of law hewn out by the finger of God, burning bushes, plagues and Passovers in Egypt. But what about God in human activity?

After nearly a year camping out in the wilderness of Sinai, God orders intense human work – skilled artistry – in the building of a movable tent called a Tabernacle and, inside it, the Ark of the Covenant. And because of this effort, God would allow God's own glory to "live" in this Tabernacle.

And right in the center of this building project is a man named Bezalel. "The LORD spoke to Moses: See, I have called by name Bezalel... and I have filled him with the Spirit of God, with ability, intelligence, and knowledge in every kind of craft, to devise artistic designs, to work in gold, silver, and bronze, in cutting stones for setting, and in carving wood, in every kind of craft" (Exodus 31:1-5). God chose a skilled artisan and had him use his artistry to show forth God's manifest presence to the people. Bezalel was a professional artisan — and through his job he would be granted the vocation to demonstrate the presence of God. Bezalel was the very first person in the Bible to ever be described as "full of the Spirit of God." It wasn't a priest or prophet or patriarch, but a blue-collar worker. Perhaps this will give us a

hint of how much God values the work of our hands. Bezalel was able to produce for the people a continual vision of God throughout their wanderings in the wilderness.

The Sacraments of the Church (Holy Baptism & Holy Communion) most completely demonstrate for us God's use of physical, earthly matter to make present and visible the invisible realm of the Spirit. They are, in fact, defined as "visible means of an invisible grace." But this religious dimension is the beginning, not the end. We are to take this life and incorporate it into all we are and all we do. We bring it into daily life: our homes, our work, our relationships with children and spouse and friends and neighbors, and yes, even enemies.

You see, we can never confine "the call" into full-time Christian service to just clergy-related vocations. Farmers and plumbers and secretaries are equally "called" and equally "full-time" and equally "Christian" and they can equally render their "service." The really crucial decision comes, not when we decide to be a pastor rather than a biologist, a deacon rather than a CPA, but when we decide to allow our entire life to be channel of divine love.

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
