



The Evangelical Tradition: Discovering the Word-Centered Life

The Evangelical Tradition of Christian life focuses upon the proclamation of the *evangel*, the Good News of the gospel. We are enabled by the power of God to take the Word of the gospel into our hearts in such a transforming way that others, seeing this, want it for themselves. This faith stream addresses the crying need for people to be reminded of the good that is in the world, its potential inside each one of us, and to see this Good News lived out practically and hear it proclaimed.

For a biblical paradigm of the Evangelical Tradition I (Richard) choose the Apostle Peter. The reason is simple: above all else, Peter was a proclaimer of the evangel, a preacher of the Good News. Peter was everywhere and in every way a fisher of people. He understood his supreme task to be making disciples for Jesus Christ.

On the day of Pentecost, the disciples – now 120 strong – had waited as instructed. The Spirit came as promised. The disciples spoke in other tongues so that the crowds gathered from the nations of the world heard them in their own languages boldly praising God. *So what did all this mean?*

Seizing the moment, Peter explained what it means. He first explained the supernatural behavior going on as a fulfillment of Joel's prophecy that the Spirit will be poured out upon all flesh.

The Spirit struck home with Peter's message: the people were "cut to the heart" and cried out "What should we do?" Peter is ready to answer: "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ" (Acts 2:38). That day, 3,000 received saving grace and immediately moved into God's new community: "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread, and to prayers" (Acts 2:42).

After His Resurrection, the Risen Christ took Peter aside and asked him three times, "Do you love me more than these?" From then on, we see a different Peter. Never perfect, of course. At one point, for example, Paul had to rebuke Peter for withdrawing from the Gentile Christians at Antioch (Galatians 2:11-14). But the spiritual substance of Peter's life had been established. He had a

new firmness in life, and we see this most clearly in Peter's ability to proclaim the Good News. Whether he is preaching in Solomon's Portico or before the Sanhedrin or in the home of Cornelius, we see someone who is constantly and consistently "holding forth the word of life" (Philippians 2:16). This is what makes Peter a faithful representation of the Evangelical Tradition.

In the two letters that have been traditionally attributed to the hand of Peter, we see the same faithfulness in gospel proclamation: "By a great mercy, God has given us a new birth into a living hope through the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (1 Peter 1:3b).

This man who began as a fisherman on the Sea of Galilee ended up fishing for people in the greatest urban center of the world: *Rome*.

In considering a contemporary model for the Evangelical Tradition, one name rises head and shoulders above all the rest: Billy Graham. Billy Graham proclaimed the gospel to monarchs and millions alike all over the world. He traveled to more places and preached to more persons than anyone in the history of Christianity.

The number and size of Graham's crusades, the multiplicity of countries and cultures he has preached in, and the reach of his elongated ministry simply stagger the imagination.

Mention must be made of the longest "crusade" ever held by Billy Graham: New York, 1957. Meeting in Madison Square Garden, Graham preached for sixteen bruising weeks with a closing rally at Times Square. It was the most broadly sponsored event Graham had had up to that point, and though it precipitated the final break with fundamentalist leaders unhappy with his growing ecumenism (working with other Christians), nothing could take away his thrill of proclaiming the gospel to overflow crowds in what Billy believed was "the most strategic center in the world."

Dare I mention the million-plus souls who gathered on Yoido Island in Seoul, Korea, in 1973? Billy Graham preached the gospel message of salvation in Jesus Christ as that solid block of humanity listened quietly, attentively, reverently.

Finally, the 1995 Crusade in San Juan, Puerto Rico perhaps became the most extensive single evangelistic outreach in the history of the Church – an outreach made possible by satellite technology that transmitted the meetings into 185 countries and territories. Graham's messages were simultaneously translated into forty-eight languages as people listened in literally thousands of venues, from sports stadiums to refugee camps.

Anyone who looks at the life ministry of Billy Graham cannot help but be struck by how focused it was. Like the best of evangelists, he was highly specific and intently focused in his ministry: to proclaim the Gospel and call people to enter saving grace. Billy Graham is a lesson in clarity and simplicity. As Graham noted, "People soon found out that my theme was always the same: God's redemptive love for sinners and the need for personal repentance and conversion."

This is what Billy Graham contributed to the Evangelical Tradition:

- (1) Billy returned a sense of integrity to evangelism. He was known for his unimpugnable moral character and he worked hard to keep scandals out of his organization. He was deeply concerned over the entrenched cultural stereotypes of evangelists as "Elmer Gantry" charlatans.
- (2) Graham worked across traditions for the sake of evangelism and mission. He worked with a broad spectrum of the Christian community to reach as many people as humanly possible, just like John Wesley before him freely cooperated with church leaders of widely differing persuasions in order to proclaim the gospel to all peoples. In fact, it has often been noted that it is hard to "pin" Billy Graham religiously or politically. He was spiritual advisor to both Republican and Democratic presidents. He may have been Southern Baptist, but he was beloved by people of all faith traditions.

(3) Graham also quietly worked for racial reconciliation:
 "When true Christians look at each other, they should see 'no color, nor class, nor condition, but simply human beings with the same longings, fears, needs, and aspirations as our own." At the 1957 New York Crusade, Billy asked Martin Luther King Jr. to lead a prayer, and later invited King to a team retreat to help them understand the racial situation more fully.

(4) Billy Graham used literally every communications tool at his disposal in the task of evangelism. Billy had his first weekly radio program back in 1944, "Songs in the Night" leading up to his beloved "The Hour of Decision." Since 1950, Billy had written a daily newspaper column, "My Answer." He published his first of many books in 1953, *Peace with God.* In 1956, he launched a new magazine, *Christianity Today*, then *Decisions* in 1960. He established the film company, World Wide Pictures, produced an average of 4 primetime specials on television each year, and used cutting-edge satellite and internet technology to transmit his messages.

"For all who are in Christ, they are a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!" This *euangelion*, this wonderful Good News, is that we no longer have to stand outside, barred from nearness to God by our sin and rebellion. Jesus Christ is the window into our ability to see and experience the presence of God already in our lives. Jesus Christ is *still* among us as the Living Word of God.

This is the core of the Evangelical Tradition: to offer people this Jesus, this Lens that enable us to experience God's love. It is the hope of the evangelist that this leads to lifelong discipleship to Christ, through which we learn how to live the abundant life of *"righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit."*

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
