One of our mission projects for November was to collect both food items and can openers for **FOCUS Food Pantry.** We were able to donate a **very heavy box of miscellaneous food items**, plus **22 can openers**. *Why can openers?* Food pantries like ours often find that some of their client families do not have a can opener at home (or lost/broke old ones), rendering many of the pantry's canned goods hard to open.

Thank you for your generosity toward our local food pantry, right when they needed it the most!

CHRISTMAS CHEER Student Gift project: We raised \$365.00 dollars for the Port Edwards school project that helps district families in various kinds of hardships with Christmas gifts. Day Trip to the 414



On Tuesday, November 18th, amid some rainy/snowy weather, a group from PEUMC piled into the Sweats' van and took a day trip to Milwaukee to tour two of our United Methodist community

programs. Our first stop was at **Northcott Neighborhood House.** NNH, whose ministries primarily support the racial minorities in their area, has at least one program for each age group, from infancy to elderly. They sponsor a course to certify young people in the field of arboriculture. They also host a weekly food pantry and an enormous community Christmas meal. Their greatest pride & joy is being the main organizer, since 1972, of the Milwaukee **Juneteenth street festival** which is one of the largest annual festivals of the city.

After a lunch at McBob's, the group then toured **Rooted & Rising.** R&R, formerly the *United Methodist Children's Service*, today sponsors a weekly food pantry, a day care center, a mental health clinic, and 72 low-income apartments. They are currently building more duplexes to add to their ministry outreach. Before leaving, the church's October donation of winter clothing & hygiene items were dropped off.

December Sermon Series (Unit #4)

"A CHARLIE BROWN CHRISTMAS"

Charlie Brown's search for meaning mirrors humanity's longing for hope. His own lament – "Isn't there anyone who knows what Christmas is all about?" – echoes the Advent cry for God's presence in a weary world.

Week 1 – November 30th – "THROWN INTO THE FIERY FURNACE" (Meshack, Shadrack, and Abednego)
The fiery furnace in Daniel 3 can represent either joyful anticipation or its
close cousin: anxiety. The three men were not unnerved by the threat of
being thrown into the furnace for their faith; they knew that, somehow, God
would protect them. God protects us, too, and helps us to lead with
confidence and anticipation, rather than anxiety.

Week 2 – December 7th – "DEM BONES, DEM DRY BONES" (Valley of the Dry Bones)

Even when we feel dry and weary – even "dead" – God can still breath new life into us. In fact, this "wintery" season of our soul is only preparation for the upcoming springtime blossoming in our lives. We just have to wait, and enjoy the rest.

Week 3 – December 14th – "THE CLAPPING TREES" (You shall go out with joy and be led forth in praise)

Just as the trees of the field will clap their hands, so Charlie Brown's little

Christmas tree will "join the chorus" transformed by love into a symbol of hope. God delights in what is humble and overlooked, turning weakness into glory.

Week 4 – December 21st – "THE WORD WAS GOD" ("and the Word lived among us")

Do not fear – you can let go of your security blanket. Linus did.

(December 28th is the First Sunday of Christmastide)





Leadership Council Update

Their November meeting was their final meeting of the year.

The Leadership Council met 8 times total.

- (1) Discipleship Discussion: Pastor asked the Council to share with the group what they have learned this year during their discipleship talks or other discipleship-related thoughts they may have. One member brought up that we need to work on bringing people together to learn more about one another, that there are many long-time church members who still don't know each other well. Surface-level, congregational-wide events are good, but we need places to be a little bit more vulnerable and learn from one another and share our stories. We need to provide more (or better?) opportunities to have more intimate, get-to-know-each-other, nurturing opportunities.
- (2) Discipleship Team Update: We are still moving ahead with our nominations for 2026.
- (3) APPROVED: For 2026, we will only be using a third-party accountant to do our payroll. The rest of the church's expenses will be paid "in house" through our church treasurer. The church treasurer will be given check-writing authority, and the Administrative Assistant will be given bookkeeping responsibilities. In lieu of this, the A.A. will receive a \$0.75 an hour raise to compensate for these additional duties.
- (4) APPROVED: With the retirement of Sandy as our accountant at the end of December, we will now contract with Ramona L. Mathews of RLM Tax & Accounting Inc. in Wisconsin Rapids for payroll work only.
- (5) AFFIRMED: The 2026 Church Budget & Pastor's Compensation Packet, along with the entire Church/Charge Conference forms have been affirmed for presentation at Church/Charge Conference.

The Do's & Don'ts of Welcoming New People to Church

I visited quite a few congregation during my college graduate years on my quest to find the best fit. Often, I was scared away by the rusty invitational and welcoming skills I encountered. The following list may seem obvious or even patronizing. I simply want to offer you an opportunity to learn from my own experience (each of the following were literally things I had to endure while visiting a new church):

What NOT to do

- DON'T tell someone they are sitting in "someone's seat." Nothing is less invitational and
 hospitable than shuffling visitors to a back row, or in my case, a folding chair in the far aisle
 behind a post.
- DON'T hug people so fiercely that they are uncomfortable. This tells them that you are shocked a visitor is among you, which is not a good message. A lot of people value personal space when it comes to strangers, so start with a handshake, eye contact, and a smile.
- DON'T invite a visitor to sit between you and other family members and then proceed to lean over the visitor to chat with your family throughout the worship service.
- DON'T discuss church business, conflicts, or grievances with new visitors, less-active members, or people outside of your congregation. They will get a negative impression of the entire church and will likely avoid being a part of it.

Yes, all of these things happened to me!

What TO do

Welcoming and inviting is actually pretty simple: **Smile, be friendly, invest time and serve as guide**. Here are some ways to put those skills into action:

- DO invite family members, friends, neighbors and others to more than just worship services. Many people are more willing to attend an event, Bible study, concert or small group gathering first.
- DO be sure at least one congregant is keeping an eye out for visitors so that they can take extra measures to connect with them and welcome them to your church.
- DO remember: When you meet a visitor, take time to get to know them. Ask questions about their life and invite them to join you for lunch. Building a friendship shows that you really care and want them to be a part of your supportive community.
- DO let visitors know about the many ministries and spiritual growth opportunities your church offers so that they get a full picture of how your congregation is following God's call.
- DO show visitors around the building so it feels familiar. Guide them to the nursery. Show them where the youth gather. Usher them to the fellowship hall for the potluck.
- DO introduce visitors to church members who are similar in age or life situation. I became a
 member at a church at the end of my long search because someone connected me with another
 young adult, who then showed me where their Sunday school class met. That's all it took for me
 to return the following week and get plugged into the community.
